## XXIX CONGRESS.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 10.—The Chair laid before the Senate a message from the President, with a letter from the Secretary of State in relation to the distribution of the fund of relief for the owner, officers and crew of the boat General Armstrong.

Among the memorials presented was one by Miller, from the Congress of the Workingmen's Club of the United States, praying for the passage of the bill establishing Postoffice Savings Banks.

After routine morning business Beck called up his bill to prohibit members of Congress from accepting retainers or employment from railroad companies which have received a grant of pecuniary aid from Congress.

Beck stated he had no remarks to make upon it and asked for its immediate consideration.

Edwards moved its reference to the Committee on Judiciary.

Beck said it would be as well to vote the bill down as to refer it to the committee.

This did not suit Beck any better.

Then Edwards repeated his motion to refer it to the committee on Judiciary.

On this the yeas and nays were taken and the motion was rejected 10 to 9.

The bill then came to a vote and was passed without a dissent to any committee.

On the passage of the bill the yeas were 27, the nays 1.

The agricultural appropriation bill was then taken up.

Miller, in the course of some remarks on the bill, referred to the ravages of the rice birds, which he said caused a loss equal to 75 per cent of all the crop of the United States.

The ravages of the rice birds, he added, were very much worse than those of the rice birds, and amounted to many millions of dollars.

It was believed by the Ornithological Association of the United States that steps should be taken to exterminate the sparrows.

This association, Mr. Miller said, was composed of amateur scientists, all over the United States, who were doing extensive work in the investigation of the food habits of birds that were injurious to agriculture.

Dolph moved an amendment reported from the committee on public lands, appropriating \$100,000 for the reclamation of the arid region in Washington Territory by sinking artesian wells.

Beck said no good had ever come from sinking artesian wells.

He opposed the amendment.

Dolph said the Territorial legislature of Washington had been authorized to sink artesian wells in the arid region to see whether water could be got there.

This amendment, he said, was a contribution by the United States to the Territory.

Beck said the individuals would also contribute to it. The whole question was one of great interest in the Northwest.

Teller advocated the amendment.

He said the discovery that water might be got in the arid region by artesian wells, was absolutely worthless without water.

Beck thought the amendment should be rejected.

An amendment authorizing men to bore into the Treasury was then taken up.

Mitchell said it was an error to suppose there was any "job" in the proposed amendment.

He said the amendment was of great importance to the Territory of Washington.

George, while favoring the amendment, was struck by the objections of Beck and Chase, and therefore moved an amendment providing that the well shall be sunk on Government land, and that such land shall be sold for sale until further provided by law.

The amendment was agreed to and the \$50,000 provided for was ordered.

Beck read to the Senate an amendment limiting to American manufacturers and inventors the right to be employed by the House appropriation of \$40,000 for experiments in the manufacture of dynamite.

After debate the amendment was agreed to.

The bill was then passed substantially as reported from the Senate committee.

McPherson introduced a bill to increase the naval establishment. It is identical in its provisions with the bill introduced by Representative Herbert in the House. It appropriates \$2,425,000.

Dolph said that the Senate had considered the bill of the Northern Pacific for the purpose of this bill.

Pending consideration of this bill, Riddinger moved to suspend the rules for the purpose of bringing up for consideration a bill to amend the act of March 3, 1879, relating to the collection of duties on imports.

It was five months, he said, since the bill was introduced in the House. It was now introduced in the Senate.

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## AMERICAN.

Wired from Washington—Report on the Edmunds Bill.

WASHINGTON, 10.—Gilbert P. Hall was today nominated as postmaster at Petaluma, California.

The Senate in secret session rejected the nomination of Peter S. Wilson to be assessor of the mint, at Denver, Colorado.

Land Commissioner Sparks has appointed Captain Jack Crawford, of New Mexico, as his assistant.

It is understood that Crawford will soon join General Miles against the Apaches.

Acting Second Comptroller McLaughlin has ordered that the effect that any volunteer soldier who was not mustered out and discharged with a regular discharge from the members of which were kept together in the same organization, and did not receive their discharge until they were paid off, should be regarded as continued in the service of the day of payment, and are accordingly entitled to credit for that period of service in computing their right to bounty.

THE EDMUNDS BILL.
