Will Hestmark Suffers From a Broken Leg and Mrs. Al. Hestmark Injured.

A most distressing and fatal runaway accident occurred yesterday afternoon at about 3 o'clock in Ogden canyon, near Wilson's saw mill. Little sevenyear-old Blaine Hestmark was so severely injured that he died at about 8 o'clock last evening. Mrs. Al. Hest-mark, his mother, was severely injured, and the uncle of the little boy, Will Hestmark, had his left leg broken in wo places

The family with Mr. Gyson and family were going up Ogden canyon to spend the summer months near Wins-low's. Will Hestmark was driving one wagon load of the company outfit, and Mrs. Al. Hestmark and her little son were riding on the wagon with him. When nearing the saw mill the front running gear of the wagon pulled out from the wagon bed and the team jumped forwards, throwing Mr. Hest-mark and the boy under the horses' eet and running gear, while Mrs. Hestwark was thrown to one side and se-ve ely bruised. Will Hestmark had his leit leg broken in two places and was otherwise severely injured. The team was stopped and the boy extricated from the wheels, but not until he was

terribly mangled and cut to pieces. Al. Hestmark, father of the boy, was coming some distance behind the rest of the company with a wagon leading a cow ar' traveled slowly. POCATELLO, IDAHO. SHOCKING ACCIDENTS.

> Frank Berkley Killed on Railroad-Brakebeam Passenger Loses a Foot.

Pocatello, July 2nd, 1901-Frank Berkey, head brakeman under Conde Harmon, an oldtimer here, was instantly killed last night at Bannock siding, seventeen miles west of Pocatello. He seventeen miles west of Pocatello. He was engaged in making a switch, by setting out some cars and was standing on the pilot of the engine, when he slipped and fell under the engine, both his legs were run over and the head severed from the body.
