

MONK'S TROUBLES AGAIN

The Ex-Recorder of Big Cottonwood. Before a Jury in Noble's Court.

THIS TIME OFFENSE IS A MISDEMEANOR.

On Appeal From a Justice's Court—Tribunal Over the Right of Way in an Alley—Court Collapses.

The trouble of James T. Monk, the ex-recorder for the Big Cottonwood district, who was not yet out of court, was believed that when he obeyed the writ of mandamus, by turning over his records to County Recorder Jensen, that the matter would end there, and such would be the case for the future. For today he is on trial before Judge Noble and a jury for misdemeanor, in that he failed to deliver on the records, in his possession, in accordance with the law, by turning over such matters. After the trial, the position of the present case, Mr. Monk will be confronted with another charge, that of perjury, if he is found guilty, that he has concealed public property. The present case, however, is an appeal from a justice's court.

The history of the case is an interesting one and dates back to last June, when County Recorder Jensen, for the purpose of obtaining possession of the missing records of the Big Cottonwood district, lodged a complaint in Justice of the Peace McKelvey's court, charging Monk with having stolen the records, with the law. He was found guilty and fined the sum of \$100, with costs. The case was then taken to the county court, where it was held that the records were not stolen, but that they were in the possession of the county recorder, and that the justice's court had no jurisdiction to try the case.

Subsequent to this another complaint was filed, on a similar charge for failure to deliver on the records, to comply with the law. This was in the justice's court, where he was found guilty and fined the sum of \$100, with costs. The case was then taken to the county court, where it was held that the records were not stolen, but that they were in the possession of the county recorder, and that the justice's court had no jurisdiction to try the case.

Only two witnesses were called, Recorder Jensen and Deputy Recorder Jensen. NATURAL GAS IS SHORT.

Supply Has Fallen Off Greatly Within the Last Few Days.

PRESSURE IS VERY LOW AGAIN TODAY.

Manufactured Gas Has to Be Used With the Natural Product—Manager Haywood Talks—Boring Near Wells.

Consumers are complaining that they are not getting a full supply of natural gas these days from the Salt Lake and Ogden Gas and Electric Light companies. In order to increase the supply of the shortage, a "new" man today has been sent to the Salt Lake and Ogden Gas and Electric Light companies. Mr. Haywood said that it was true that their patrons were not getting their full quota of natural gas, but that the deficiency was made up by the manufactured gas. Amplifying on the matter Mr. Haywood said that H. L. Driver, a contractor for the Salt Lake and Ogden Gas and Electric Light company, with 200,000 cubic feet of natural gas per day but that they were not doing it. Yesterday and today he said the pressure was low and the flow of gas so much reduced that only 50,000 feet were furnished. The extra amount required by patrons therefore, had to be manufactured and mixed with the natural gas. "This is a condition that we are getting tired of," said Mr. Haywood. "The Salt Lake and Ogden Gas and Electric Light companies are not getting their full quota of natural gas, but that the deficiency is made up by the manufactured gas."
