

FORESTRY MEETING.

Important Questions Discussed by the Society Last Night.

The regular monthly meeting of the Utah Forestry Association was held last night in the City and County building. After roll call the president, Dr. John H. Park, proposed four questions for discussion:

1. Is it possible and desirable to secure a permanent growth of shade trees on each side of the State Street boulevard of the city at least as far as the south drive of the Post House?

2. Is it expedient and possible to at least do something of good overgrown trees, but especially for decorative and holiday purposes? Control our conservancy under the command of a cheap rate?

3. Should not an office of forestry be created in the state capital? It would be a great service to the state, if it were filled by a qualified combination of forestry or forest master, with power?

4. Should not a committee be appointed to consider a plan for the enforcement of Article 10 of the state constitution which makes it necessary to be carried out throughout the Territory?

The motion of Mr. J. J. Faust's committee of three was appointed by the chair to consider the first proposition. The president appointed Dr. George M. Smith, Mr. Christopherson and Dr. J. J. Faust.

C. A. Whiting moved that a committee of three, who sit, Christopherson as chairman, be appointed to the state to consider the second proposition. As a result, Dr. C. A. Whiting was appointed Prof. D. H. Allen and Mr. F. A. Dix.

On motion it was decided to be the sense of the association that a forestry officer be provided for the new City Hall.

On motion of Mr. Christopherson the president was asked to appoint a committee to report on the best mode of utilizing Arbor Day. The president appointed Prof. D. H. Allen, President J. H. Park and Mr. Whiting to the committee.

A motion was made by C. A. Whiting that a committee of three be appointed by the president to consider the third proposition. The president appointed Prof. D. H. Allen and Mr. F. A. Dix.

On motion it was decided to be the sense of the association that a forestry officer be provided for the new City Hall.

The various lodges of the A. O. U. W. in the Park are making general arrangements for a public entertainment next week during the middle of the month. The program has nearly 200 speakers in Park City.

Mr. and Mrs. David Keith started their vacation in Park City on Friday evening, the 27th, and will spend the winter. Mr. Keith will return to the Park in about ten days.
