## WANT EXPERIMENT STATION

On Utah Reserve to Help Develop Vast Agricultural Empire.

Provo, Jan. 26.—A memorial will be presented to the legislature by O. W. Jarvis and others interested in the Utah reservation country, asking for the establishment of an agricultural experiment station in northeastern Utah.

The reasons for the request are that the soil and climatic conditions there are favorable for the great basin section of the state, when the soil is formed by deposition, while in the reservation country it formed by erosion, and that there has been considerable farming done there, which leaves the new settlers under the necessity of experimenting in order to determine the methods adapted to conditions there, which will be a waste of time and effort that can be overcome through the work of an experiment station.

The memorialists, in order to impress the legislature with the importance of the contemplated station point out that there are 450,000 acres of land in eastern Utah capable of being irrigated, while all the land irrigated in the state, according to the twelfth census report is 410,000 acres.

## FIVE CENT FARE DEMANDED

City Council Holds up Railway Franchise—S. S. Worker Honored.

At the city council meeting Tuesday night the city fathers had a somewhat perplexed problem to deal with. A number of ladies interested in rooming house business were present, claiming they will be unjustly dealt with if an ordinance is allowed to be passed requiring them to pay for per quarter for each room maintained. They demanded the license as exorbitant and unjust. Exorbitant because rooms were frequently not in use, and unjust because they are obliged to compete with foreigners who rent one room from 15 to 20 persons, and would receive from 15 to 20 per cent more profit. The argument prevailed and the ordinance was held for further consideration.

Mayor Brown was in possession of a letter from E. W. Robinson, mayor of Logan, which was read, asking the support in a movement to establish a state league of municipalities, that city officers may become acquainted with the procedure of business, and more efficient work done and time saved. It was suggested that as many as could should attend the initial meeting to be held in Salt Lake City Feb. 15, 1907.

The committee on streets, after investigating the side walk on the north side of Vine street, recommended that the sidewalk be required to be of the same width, which is the cause of the difficulty, and that the city do the filling in and the grading.
