"A bill has been introduced," he con-tinued, "giving the governor specific authority to investigate the condition of administrative departments. The wisdom of this is obvious. MRS. HOUSER SUICIDES.

Woman is Unknown. St. Louis, May 12.-Mrs. Agnes Bar-low Houser, wife of Daniel M. Houser, president of the Globe Printing com-pany, publishing the Globe-Democrat, died tonight from the effects of a self-indicted bullet wound in the right temple. Mrs. Houser was found this evening by her husband on his return from an automobile ride with his two sons. He was informed by servants that his wife was in her room breath-ing heavily and evidently ill. Mr. Houser entered the room and found his wife on the bed with a revolver in her hand. She was unconscious, but breathing faintly. Physicians were quickly summoned, but medical atten-tion was without avail. Mrs. Houser had been in a very ner-vous state for the past three or four months. Members of the family are at a loss to assign a reason for her act. Worry and mental strain in participat-ing in the charity carrival given Fri-day are the only possible causes they can assign. There was nothing to fin-dicate whether death was accidental or premeditated. It is not known where she secured the revolver. THANKS FROM ELLEN TERRY.

## TWO MEN DROWNED At Occan Park, Cal., in View of Eight

Thousand Persons.

Thousaud Persons. Santa Monica, Cal. Hay 12.-Two men were drowned in the surf at Ocean park this afternoon by the capsizing of a gasoline launch. For pearly an hour and a half the vietims clung to the over-turned vessel in full view of 5,000 people, while desperate efforts were made to achieve their rescue. Finally one of the men, a San Pedro fisherman, exhausted by the pounding of the waves and long struggle to keep his head above water, cut the lashings that bound him to the little craft and dropped into the water, evidently hoping to be washed asbore instead, he disappeared from view and was swept seaward by the undertow. John Cochran, owner of the vessel, re-mained bound until the incoming tids overwheimed and drowned him. His body was recovered some time later when cf-forts to reach the launch succeded.

### A DASTARDLY OUTRAGE.

House Blown up and Five Negroes Killed.

Ruston, Le., May 12.--Unknown per-sons set off a charge of some high explosive here under the house of Samuel Cook, a negro, sarly today, blowing the house to pleces and killing Cook and four other negroes sleeping in a front room. Cook's body was blown about 80 feet away into the fork of a tree. The body of a woman was blown 100 feet or more into the air, falling through the branches of a high tree.
