May Close N. Y. Theaters.

New York, April 29,-It has de-veloped that several of the smaller theaters here have failed to complete alterations ordered by the city authorities immediately after the Iroquois disaster in Chicago and it is possible several houses will be compelled to close on the first of May when their licenses expire.

May Corporation Disbusements

New York, April 29 .- Disbursements for corporations in May will be the smallest for that month in a series of year, according to estimates compiled year, according to estimates compiled by the Journal of Commerce. The total bases on returns thus far, is only \$14,-991, 357, against \$31,987, 234, in 1993 and \$27,675,155 in May 1992. This change in the May dividend situation is easily explained. Last year the U, S. Steel corporation paid a quarterly dividend of \$8,930,496, but this year the disbursements will be reduced to disbursements will be reduced to \$6,054,919 in consequence of the conversion of preferred stock into bonds Other companies will disburse divi-dends on a reduced percentage and several which paid last year will be missing from the list.
