DIVIDED INTO CLASSES. 1.-Classification of student activities. For the purpose of control, all student activities snai be divided into two class-es. Class A: All athletics, such as foot-ball, baleball, basketball and track games. Class B: All lietrary activities, such as debating, dramatics, college paper work and yearbook work.


