

ADJACENT CITIES PROVO.

A Novel Exhibit at the Primary Conference: It May Go to the World's Fair—Legal and Other Items.

Provo, April 28.—At the Primary conference held yesterday in this city there was exhibited a small rustic stand that is somewhat of a novelty. It represents the Primary children and their work. The stand is supported in one end of a rough hewn stump on which rests a globe. Inside the globe is a glass globe with a silver foot, containing over 5000 grains of sand and pebbles, sent in by the Primary children of Utah state. Surrounding the globe is a band of letters, each of which is a name of a child. The other end of the stand consists of a box, in which is a drawer containing a record of the children who have donated a grain of sand. At the foot of the stand are a number of small shells, and these come forth from the electric glass and pebbles. The stand is secured from the inside by a wire which is secured around the stand. The stand is a masterpiece of work, and it is to be placed in the Salt Lake Temple, but it may be sent to the World's Fair.

OGDEN.

Closing Proceedings of the Trans-Mississippi Congress.—The Statehood Discussion.—Other Matters.

Ogden, Utah, April 28.—When the Trans-Mississippi Congress resumed yesterday afternoon Judge C. C. Goodwin took the platform and proceeded to read out a long list of microscopical specimens coupled with a few facts. His main talk was upon past events and probabilities for the future. His entire remarks were full of hatred and spite against the Mormons.

He was followed by Hon. David Evans, who stated the part he had taken in Utah affairs, and mentioned he had arrived at his belief in the sincerity of the people.

Mr. Hayward of Idaho wanted the matter talked at he would ask the chairman of the committee on resolutions to call it in. He was specially chosen, however, by a vote of "aye" and "no" and called for the question.

Hon. F. B. Richards of Salt Lake was the next speaker. He told the congress how and why the People's party had been dissolved and corrected a number of Judge Goodwin's misstatements.

Governor Thomas then took occasion to have his little say. He admitted that polygamy was dead, but said there were other things. He failed to state what they were, however. During his remarks he made mention of the fact that Ogden was a Liberal city. Some one shouted, "It is a Democracy." The governor replied, "Yes, it is by the Utah commission machine."

At length the governor did his party more harm than good.

Hon. T. M. Patterson of Colorado took the floor and proceeded to denigrate the People's party with the Liberal party. He said he had studied the Mormon question for years, had been to the Territory and always found them gentlemanly, intelligent, honest and the most hospitable people on earth, and he explained why they were. He said no longer be deprived of statehood.

In the midst of his speech Hon. T. M. Patterson challenged a remark he made, but was met by the answer that he himself caused the mayor of the capital city to sink into his seat and remain quiet the rest of the afternoon.

All the above took place amid the wildest confusion and disorder. The scene was indescribable. It was almost impossible at times to even hear the speakers. Pandemonium was torn loose in all directions.

Finally the question was put and resulted in 1025 votes being cast in favor of statehood and 903 against it. Utah did not vote.

As soon as this question was settled, which was 5 o'clock, an adjournment was taken until 7 p. m.

with Wm. M. Stewart as chairman, to appoint a committee to present the memorial and resolutions passed to the Congress of the United States. Resolutions backing the port and present efforts, the officers of Ogden for their hospitality, Col. Irish for the part he has taken in the congress, the Ogden land, the press and the ladies, were all adopted, and this most important body adjourned this day.

The committee having the matter of statehood in hand has been considerably hindered in the work by the two wingmen, but now that everything has been cleared away its members will resume their labors with renewed energy, and prospects of getting the word come bright for Ogden.

The board of trade at the next meeting will discuss the Gail patent and make an effort to arrive at some conclusion regarding the patent. No time for the meeting has been taken up to date of the chair.

The Southern Pacific passenger car with two wheels has been on account of the heavy passenger traffic. Altogether there were 227 passengers on board, most of whom were bound for the World's Fair. The railroad is sending all their available cars west for the purpose of accommodating the World's Fair traffic, which has now become very heavy. Tonight the Southern Pacific will bring in 15 cars, all well filled.

This morning the Southern Pacific train from the west and on board, in addition to a large list of first and second class passengers, eighty Chinamen in charge of United States soldiers. These are laborers for the plantations of an East Indian planter. Under the present Chinese exclusion act Chinamen are not allowed to land in the United States unless they are returning from a visit, and even then they must be identified with letters and photographs. In order, however, that laborers may pass through the country on their way to foreign parts they are permitted to land and then they are passed on to the continent in charge of officers.

Improvements of the Town.—General Condition of the People.—Other Matters.

Midway, Utah, April 25, 1903.—As a town has improved in a few weeks, the quiet, thriving town of Midway for a long time, perhaps a few weeks will be passed with interest.

We have had a long winter and plenty of snow, which is encouraging for the farmers and makes them smile, but the late cold spring is rather changing their smiling countenance to that of a disapproving frown, for at this writing plowing has hardly commenced, and it is greatly retarded by frequent rain and snow accompanied by a bitter cold wind, which is also detrimental to the growing grain and corn that has just been sown.

The health of the people is generally good, and though there were several cases of severe sickness, I have learned that of one death having occurred this year, on the other hand there have been many births.

Our ward, ecclesiastically speaking, is in a healthy condition. The meetings are well attended and the Saints are generally awake to the duties devolving upon them, but, nevertheless, there is room for improvement. Although our people cannot put their crops in as early as usual they are not late, but are busy beautifying the town, by making lawns, setting trees, etc., where the same has not already been done; the cemetery also is being beautified and the city of the dead made more pleasant and beautiful.

The new amusement hall which was commenced last April is not yet completed, but is expected to be finished at an early date, and Midway will then have, without exception, the best amusement hall in the county.

According to reports, R. A. Schneider's pleasure resort will be opened in due time for the season, and there will be another, as Dr. M. Murdoch is building a grand resort which promises to be the metropolis of them all.
