# Orchestra and Singers Share Honors in "Carmen"

The Landmark Opera company continues to delight immense audiences at the Colonial. Last night the offering was "Carmen," the great masterpiece of Bizet.

Few grand operas equal this in popularity. It possesses many haunting melodies and intense situations. Bizet gave the libretto a most elaborate musical setting, with flesh and blood characters. It is clear and logical without a suggestion of dullness in it. The main interest centers in Carmen, who is the embodiment of smiling, bewitching, tantalizing impudence. A happy, impulsive creature, fairly bubbling with an excess of the pure joy of living. Gay, flippant, and always ready for a new flirtation and by her very nature demanding homage from those about her. Yet she is not without a certain dignity and sense of honor. Entirely loyal to her convictions, devoted to her comfortable and "Love first; duty afterward," and true to the death where her real affections are concerned. Some actresses see fit to make the character of Carmen unrefined and coarse in the extreme, thus detracting from its wonderful charm and losing the original idea of the composer. On the other hand, one does not desire a tame, prudish Carmen. She is simply a wild little gypsy who follows in her own happy way the dictates of a passionate, untamed nature.

Delores Strain in the title role gave a brilliant and effective representation. She possesses a beautiful face, a voice of caressing tenderness as well as dramatic intensity, and exceptional powers as an actress. From her first scene on, her tragic ending, she held the audience fascinated. Her song, "Love will like a wild birding fly," with its peculiar rhythm and characteristic Spanish melody, was excellently done. Her beautiful company and dancing assurance in the encounter with the captain in the first act, was also an accomplished bit of acting. Especially fine was her Bohemian song and dance, and the beginning of the second act, and her improvised dance for Don Jose, which she gave with alluring grace.

Michaela was beautifully interpreted by Olga Simola, who has a voice of tender sweetness and is a graceful libretto actress as well. Her best opportunities were in her first solo and duet with Don Jose and "I said naught should frighten me here." She brought out the appealing sweetness of the character, in the camp of the gypsies, where her frail powers are pitted against the

## MANY HEAR FRED SMITH.

Interesting Subjects Discussed Before Large Gatherings.

The great number of business men and others who turned out yesterday afternoon and evening to hear Fred B. Smith testify of the interest of Salt Lake people in his work, which is being conducted under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A.

After his address at the university, Mr. Smith spoke in the Colonial theater to a good crowd of business men, on the subject, "Life's Most Vital Question." In the evening he spoke in the Y. M. C. A. to a good audience on the subject, "Men Wanted." In the course of his stirring talk Mr. Smith emphasized work as one of the greatest blessings of mankind. He encouraged his hearers to not shirk, and to not look for those who do so will fail. Only those who are willing to work will get to the front and stay there.

He spoke of an experience he had in New York, when one morning he looked through the papers and found that several thousand men were wanted for various positions. At the same time he found that thousands of men were begging in cheap lodging houses because they could not get employment. Evidently something was wrong with some of those men.

Mr. Smith also referred to the fact that so many men of the country ran to sea, so much in their efforts to obtain employment, and assured his hearers that in many cases it is not productive of good.

Sunday night Mr. Smith will speak at the Colonial theater on the subject, "The Other Man."

The address at the Colonial theater at noon today was on the subject, "The Unanswered Question." A good crowd turned out to hear the last noon address.

scornful disdain or the mocking Carmen. Prunilla, by Madam Buganelli, Mercedes, by Madam Diana, were well rendered, their work in the duets and quartets being exceedingly clever. The Don Jose of Signor Batain was another triumph added to his laurels. His personal personality is never for a moment lost sight of. His impassioned appeal for Carmen's favor, his desperate frenzy when he realizes the loss of her affection and the final suddenness of death, were so strongly demonstrated in voice and action that the audience was spellbound.

Signor Antonio, "Escuella" was a most dashing Tureador, and sang the Tureador song in a realistic fashion. His efforts at all times denote the strongly intelligent and careful artist. He sang with such ease and assurance and with a free tone that carries well.

Mancero as Captain Zuniga, was excellent and entirely capable of bringing out the full force of the score. Dancairo, Morales, and Romendado sang the minor roles effectively and gave good support to the principals. Several other parts were well done. One repeated the necessity for omitting the boys' chorus. However, one can not but wonder why the stormy ending of Don Jose and Carmen, "Over the Hills and Through the Glades," should be omitted, as it takes away the splendid climax, changes the character of the part and considerably weakens the whole scene.

The Intermezzo, with the harp and flute part brought out prominently in a delicious melody accompanied by the orchestra and was beautifully rendered by the orchestra and was thoroughly enjoyed by those who were listening instead of holding audible converse with their neighbor across the aisle. Under the master hand of Signor Jacchia was indeed worthy of much better attention than it got from some parts of the audience. The effect of the spirited and thrilling overture given in such fashion was completely lost by the confusion of seating a large crowd of late comers, to the distinct annoyance of the orchestra and the enjoyment of the entire opera, overture and all. The overture is as much a part of the performance as the grand finale. Perhaps if we could have grand opera in Salt Lake, where we boast of being musical and appreciative, a little oftener than once a year, we might possibly learn to treat it with respect when we hear it. One would like to see a make the second effort to find a seat in the Berlin, Vienna or other grand opera houses of Europe, after the orchestra has been called into position to perform, and then to expect royalty in state and laparomus.

The stake hall was entirely filled before the hour of commencement, 2 p. m. A multitude of flowers covered the casket and stand and tables. Charles E. Daves of the bishopric of Cannon ward conducted the exercises. Solos were beautifully sung by Emma Ramsey Morris and Charles R. Burton, Alston, Keddington and Weeling rendered two selections. The Twelfth ward quartet furnished the music at the grave. The prayers were offered by Joseph A. Wells and Seymour B. Young, Elders Francis M. Lyman, Heber J. Grant and Orson F.
