SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY.

The common cold is now classed by some authorities among the diseases due to bacteria. It has not been settled that any particular organism is the cause, but it seems that more than one species may play an active part, and a recent British investigator reports that in one severe local epidemic he found Micrococcus catarrhalis present in all cases, while in two other epidemics, both of a severely infectious character, the bacillus of Friedlander was recognized in every case examined at its onset. The organism, however, often disappears within 24 or 48 hours. In the second and third epidemics infection sometimes occurred, produc-

an eruption is an overflow from the earth's molten interior, 30 or 40 miles or more below the surface, but the evidence is strong that the source of the material is never more than two or three miles deep, and the quantity is small compared with the mass of the earth—perhaps not more than three cubic miles of lava having been discharged in the greater recorded outpour. The eruptions, moreover, tend to recur in the same spot—perhaps thousands of times before the activity wanes. This could be explained by assuming that radium is being generated at a depth of two or three miles in each active crater, as the heat from the breaking up of the emanation would accumulate until sufficient to melt a portion of the rocks, and on the discharge of the molten mass through the action of steam or otherwise, the process would be repeated until the exhaustion of the radium.

A chessplayer's timekeeper is the novelty of Herr Veenhoff of Groningen. It consists of two similar small clocks, behind which is a double lever so arranged that it can touch a button to start the clock of A as the latter begins to move, and A can touch another button to stop his own clock and start the other as B's play commences. At the

end of the game the clocks show the total time taken for the moves of each player.

Diving for Amber.

Amber is supposed to be gum which exuded from trees that in some former geological age covered certain parts of the earth's surface, but of which not a vestige remains. In corroboration of this theory, we have the evidence of insects found imbedded in the amber, showing every evidence of having struggled hard to free themselves from the sticky substance upon which they had alighted or been driven. The shores of the Baltic sea are the world's principal source of amber. Here a large number of people earn a precarious livelihood by gathering the precious substance along the shore. They

work only in rough weather, for it is only then that the boulders are tossed and tumbled on the bottom and great quantities of submarine vegetation dislodged, hidden among the roots and branches of which are lumps of the precious gum. At some points along the coast, divers search the bottom of the sea for lumps of amber hidden in sea weed or jammed between rocks. The largest piece ever found weighed 15 pounds, valued at \$30,000. It is now in the Royal museum in Berlin.—Technical World.

Royal Opera House or the Court theater. His ministers and courtiers must be in evidence at all these ornamental functions, and they are required to appear in full uniform, with all their orders and decorations blazing on their breasts.

PRINCIPAL SUPPER.

Prince Buelow has been the principal sufferer from the necessity of attending these useless gatherings. During his six years in office he has been present at hundreds of banquets, charity fetes, gala performances and other court functions. His absence would be regarded as an offense to the kaiser and as a slight on the dignity of the imperial court. On such occasions the duties of high dignitaries are accompanied by the kaiser are frequently onerous. If, for instance, the kaiser opens an art gallery he will certainly make a rapid tour of the entire exhibition, looking at every picture, passing rapid criticism upon it, then turning on to the next, and so on from room to room with breathless speed. The members of his suite must follow him step by step and likewise look at each picture. At the end of the performance their limbs are weary and their heads are stiff from gazing upward. They must literally dance attendance on their imperial master.

At great court functions six exalted dignitaries of the empire, all of whom are noblemen of ancient descent, act as waiters at the table at which the kaiser and the members of the imperial family are seated. They bring the dishes from the sideboard, offer them to the kaiser and his family and remove the dirty dishes out of the banquet chamber. On the occasion of weddings in the imperial family about a score of exalted dignitaries have to perform the famous torch dance for the edification of the kaiser and his hundreds of invited guests. Bearing huge candles in their hands, they have to shuffle round the room with a quaint tripping dance step to the strains of a melodious polka, bowing and scraping to the emperor at every turn and at every other step. The sight of these dignified personages ambulating round the great White Hall of the palace in Berlin is one of the most ludicrous sights imaginable.

Apart from dancing attendance on the kaiser, the cabinet ministers and high officers of state are obliged to maintain little courts of their own at which lesser stars appear. Night after night they must give or attend dinners the recipients. The kaiser finds it possible to combine a maximum of social gaiety with a maximum of hard work and they must do the same. It is their misfortune that the kaiser is the eighth wonder of the world, who in his own person has almost solved the problem of perpetual motion.

\$2,500 FOR TWO SONGS: WHAT CARUSO GOT.

ing either a second acute cold or else a chronic cold lasting for months, and the bacillus was so virulent that it killed inoculated mice, guinea pigs and even rabbits.

A problem for the horticulturists is the production of a profitable rubber-bearing fruit, which would make possible an unlimited supply of valuable material without injury to the plants. The fruits of the ordinary plants contain little rubber, but Prof. Warburg, a German, points out that certain parasitic plants—the caoutchouc mistletoes, discovered three years ago in Venezuela—hold out the hope that the ideal fruit may be realized. The caoutchouc in some of these species amounts to one-fifth of the weight of the dried fruit. The fruit is not very large, but varies in size in the three groups of species of these mistletoes. The caoutchouc, instead of being a milky juice, is in the form of a solid envelope surrounding the seeds.

A novel alloy shown by J. E. Stead at a recent soiree of the London Royal society offers striking possibilities for ornamental effects. It contains 75 per cent of tin, 20 of antimony and 5 of arsenic, and on slow cooling from fusion it forms semi-spherical, shell-like crystals in the metal matrix. Dilute acids dissolve away part of the matrix, leaving in relief the crystals, which resist on account of richness in antimony and arsenic. The spherical patterns take a high polish, and may be given greater prominence by running wax into the cavities.

The mystery of volcanoes is being gradually cleared up by the investigations of radio-activity. If the conclusions of Maj. C. E. Dutton, U. S. A., are correct, it can no longer be supposed that
