Diving for Amber.

Amber is supposed to be gum which exuded from trees that in some former geological age covered certain parts of the earth's surface, but of which not a vestige remains. In corrobora-tion of this theory, we have the evi-In corroboradence of insects found imbedded in the amber, showing every evidence of having struggled hard to free themselves from the sticky substance upon which they had alighted or been driven. The shores of the Baltic sea a sea are the

world's principal source of amber. Here a large number of people earn a precarious livilhood by gathering the pre-ious substance along the store. They

A novel alloy shown by J. E. Stead at a recent solvee of the London Royal so-ciety offers striking possibilities for or-namental effects. It contains 75 per cent of tin, 20 of antimony and 5 of arsenic; and on slow cooling from fusion it forms semi-spherical, shell-like crystals in the metal matirx. Dilute acids dissolve away part of the matrix, leav-ing in relief the crystals, which resist on account of richness in antimony and arsenic. The spherical patterns take a high polish, ad may be given greater prominence by tunning way into the prominence by running wax into the cavities.
