LOCAL BRIEFS.

The first of this week's organ recitals at the Tabernacle will take place tomorrow afternoon at 5:20 sharp.

The bloodhounds at the state prison made a record run yesterday, running down their man in 16 minutes from the time of starting. There were five dogs in the pack, and Warden Pratt is much pleased with the performance.

With the intention of entering the Order of the Holy Cross, three Utah girls left yesterday for Notre Dame, Ind. They are Miss Martha Bullock and Miss Ethel Prinsbe of Salt Lake, and Miss Philomena Griffin of Bingham.

The ladies of the First Congregational church flower mission will be at the Church Wednesday morning for the reception of flowers to be given to the sick in the hospitals and in homes. The ladies ask that contributions be handed in before 10 o'clock.

The funeral of Charles S. Richardson will be held at 5 p. m. today from his late residence, 7 Twelfth East street. Owing to the illness of Mrs. Richardson, the funeral will be private, with interment at Mt. Olivet. Rev. Dr. Patton will conduct the services.

The body of the late General Penrose now interred at the Fort Douglas cemetery, is to be exhumed and shipped for final interment to the national cemetery at Arlington Heights. The change will be made in October under the direction of the war department.

At yesterday morning's services in the Unitarian church, Field Secretary G. W. Stone of the American Unitarian association stated that Unitarianism is taking a strong hold among the people of the west, and that there were now 24 Unitarian churches on the Pacific coast.

Father Jose Alguo, director of the Philippine weather bureau, was in the city yesterday en route to the coast from the St. Louis fair. He reports the equipment of the bureau as very complete, and of great value in securing weather reports from more than one-half of the 8,000,000 natives are civilized.

Lieutenants R. E. Beebe and S. M. Parker of the Twenty-third infantry were elected to membership Saturday evening in the University club. Lieutenant Beebe graduated from the University of Michigan in 1899, and Lieutenant Parker graduated from West Point in 1903. Both officers are stationed at Fort Douglas.

Colonel and Mrs. E. F. Holmes have bought five pictures from the Morris art collection, and they are now on the walls of the art gallery at the Holmes residence. The pictures are "The Crystal Lake," "The Ideal Head," "The Recital," "The Cardinal's Blessing," and "Fleet Street by St. Paul's." They are all the works of art.

Deputy sheriffs have been guarding the Portland cement works to prevent possible injury from the strikers, and particularly as the latter have been threatening the new Greek employees who are loading. The force is about up to the usual size, and no inconvenience is being experienced by the management of the works.

The Liberty state will give its first grand reunion at Salt Lake tomorrow, when there will be prize waltzing contests, a baseball game, between the married and single men, children's fancy drills, selections by the combined choirs of the state, an enlarged orchestra, and an enjoyable program of dances. A general invitation is extended.

Jessie Davis, a young woman who was arrested several days ago on the charge of grand larceny, is now free again. Judge Diehl dismissed the case against her this morning. It was alleged that she robbed a stranger of a valuable gold watch. The evidence against her was not sufficient to convict, and the court ordered her discharge.

Maurice M. Ranney, the waiter who was assaulted on Commercial street in front of the Red Onion saloon last night, died at the state mental hospital at Provo. Ever since the brutal assault, Ranney has been in a semi-conscious condition, and when at times, he appeared conscious, he was unable to give an account of the affair or tell who assaulted him.

Twelve officers of the local national guard examined the new shooting range at Fort Douglas yesterday, and several of the post officers went over the ground with them making necessary explanations. The entire guard will visit the range during the summer and try their hand, the interest being heightened by the fact that a gold medal awaits the guardman whose score foot up the highest at the end of the season.

Mrs. Sarah Volpert, who resides at 24 Aberdeen street, and Mrs. Anna Elizabeth West, residing at 233 South Second West, were examined as to their sanity on Saturday afternoon before Judge Lewis and were committed to the state mental hospital. Mrs. Volpert is 33 years of age and is the wife of Morris Volpert. Mrs. West is 34 years of age and is the wife of Byron West. Both women have several small children.

Spontaneous combustion was the cause of a small blaze that occurred at the home of T. F. Marsh, 541 South Ninth West street about 10:40 o'clock last night. The family was about to retire when the smell of burning clothing was doing. On investigation it was found that a fire was in progress in some clothing in the kitchen. An alarm was sounded, but when the fire apparatus reached the scene, the blaze was practically out. The damage was about \$10.

A well attended Sunday school conference was held yesterday in the First ward of Liberty stake, Supt. Geo. Hilton presiding. Elders Hugh B. Fossum and Joseph R. Squires of the stake Sunday school board were present and the authorities of the Church, stake and ward, were unanimously sustained. A short but well rendered program was given. Bro. R. Leo Bird was honorably released as teacher of the preparatory theological class, he having been appointed a member of the stake Sunday school board. Geo. Hilton is superintendent of the school, John Vetterli first assistant, Fred S. Musser, second assistant and Wm. Lindstrom, secretary.

Hoyle Sherman has returned from his eastern business trip. He spent some time at his wife's fair, and in reference to this expressed a wish that all Utah visitors register at the state building, and leave their addresses that mail may reach them. Utah day will be changed from Oct. 20 to some day in the last week during September, and at the latter time the two carloads of Utah fruit will be on the ground. A GOOD MAN GONE. Thomas H. Green, Coachman for Pres. John Taylor, Called Home.

Thomas H. Green, for many years a carriage driver for President John Taylor, and a highly respected resident of this city, died last night at the home of his son David, 433 West Sixth South street, from senile debility, at the ripe age of 85 years. The deceased was a native of Lancashire, England, where he joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, of which he was a faithful and devoted member ever since. He emigrated to Utah some time like 30 years ago, since which time he has resided constantly in this city, winning many friends by his good deeds and kindly disposition. He leaves three children, two sons and a daughter, to mourn his loss.
