The delegates from Onondaga County to the Democratic Convention selected to-day, are against Tilden.

SAN FRANCISCO, 10.—A Prescott, Arizona, dispatch says: All the newspapers here, both democratic and republican, denounce in strong terms the charges preferred against Judge Silent and the motives of those preferring them, and assert that the California delegation in Congress had been misled by Chas. P. Egan, who went to Washington to prefer the charges, and who is the agent of the Peck Mining Company, which recently lost a suit in Judge Silent's court.

WASHINGTON, 10.—The Democratic Senatorial Caucus lasted four hours, and the discussion on the Kellogg-Spofford case was animated. Bayard, Lamar, Kernan, Garland and others opposed its consideration; Saulsbury, Hill, Vance and Jones favored it. The argument was advanced that some democrats would oppose the seating of Spofford and the unseating of Kellogg. Hill said, nevertheless the committee should do its duty. The effect of the settlement of the question on the Presidential election ought not to figure in the case. A resolution was adopted by a majority of three providing that the Geneva award bill shall first be considered and disposed of, to be followed by the Kellogg case, unless the caucus decides otherwise. It is understood that the case is not settled, and another caucus will be held.

BUFFALO, 10.—The water was the highest for years, overflowing the wharves and almost entirely submerging the island between the river and lake, the inhabitants of which had to flee for their lives. A number of shanties and five boat-houses were washed away. The low lands from Erie Street to Black Rock are entirely submerged, and a portion of the Lockport branch of the New York Central road is washed so that trains had to be abandoned. On the Main Street line a car was blown from the track and a number of buggies overturned. No lives reported lost.

WEST POINT, 10.—Whittaker testified that he had no conversation with his assailants except to beg them not to cut his ear. His condition was carefully considered by the surgeon. He stated that an oath was binding on his conscience, and he warmly believed a false oath involved future punishment. At the request of the recorder he then firmly took an oath, looking squarely in the face of the recorder that all he said was true.

Two barbers testified that the small scissors found in his room could not have cut his hair as it is now cut.

CINCINNATI, 10.—Enoch Mosslander, a bachelor, 77 years old, and reported wealthy, was discovered burned to death in his farmhouse near Bellaire. The theory is that the robbers burned him trying to extract from him the secret where he kept his money, that having been once before attempted.

FAIRFIELD, Maine, 10.—Near Woodstock Junction, on the New Brunswick Railway, to-day, a baggage car and one passenger car overturned, and the latter was nearly destroyed, yet of the 15 persons in it only one was seriously hurt.

CHICAGO, 10.—A *Times* Washington special declares that Acklen and King have gone to Louisiana for a duel, but a New Orleans special says the story is undoubtedly false, Acklen only being there to conduct his congressional campaign.

LOUISVILLE, 10.—Mrs. Wilhelma Trieske, a German lady, 50 years of age, living on Eleventh Street, near Jefferson, was murdered by her insane son, with a butcher knife.

READING, 10.—An explosion of dynamite, at Donnington, killed John Powell and Robert Taylor, and severely injured 12 others. The killed and wounded were quarrymen.

NORWALK, Conn., 10.—The committee of inquiry report the charges of immoral conduct against Rev. A. W. Paige true, and recommend his expulsion from the conference.

HAVERHILL, Mass., 12.—A two-story wooden tenement block here was burned this a.m. It was occupied by 10 families. Smith H. Brown, alias McHenry, aged 38, and Charles Abbott aged 56, were suffocated. Mrs. Emma Roberts was severely burned in the face and injured internally by jumping from

a window. The damage is \$20,000, insured.

ST. LOUIS, 12.—The tow boat *Iron Mountain* of the Mound City Transportation Co., left here to-day for New Orleans with 300,000 bushels of corn, one of her barges the *Grand Republic* having 100,000 bushels on board. The freight receipts amount to \$36,000.

A fracas at a country dance in Callaway County, Mo., on Friday night resulted in the killing of L. H. Myers by M. Walton. The murderer is arrested.

Wm. Fitzgerald, a painter, shot and instantly killed M. Nestman, this morning during a quarrel over a trifle.

DEADWOOD, 22.—Nine Sioux, well mounted, appeared on Bell Ranch ran off 25 head of horses belonging to ranchers. Pursuit was made, shots were exchanged and one horse was recaptured.

NEW ORLEANS, 12.—The democratic primaries throughout the State for delegates to the State convention resulted almost entirely for Hancock. The delegation to Cincinnati will go uninstructed, but understand that they are under no circumstances to favor Tilden.

SAN ANTONIO, 12.—William Hood and engineers arrived from San Francisco to survey the Southern Pacific to El Paso.

A band of desperadoes are operating in Kenny County, stealing and driving cattle across the Rio Grande. The captain is a well known Mexican bandit.

PITTSBURG, 12.—Mrs. Rachel Smith, the victim of a brutal attack at her home in Adamsburg, Westmoreland County, last Thursday night, died this morning. There is no clue as yet to the murderers.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., 12.—An official order is just published here issued by Postmaster General Key, restoring the use of the mail to R. C. Wintersmith, supervisor of the Frankfort school fund lottery.

CHICAGO, 12.—The *Inter-Ocean's* Washington special says: The extraordinary number of emigrants arriving this spring is attracting attention, and if it keeps up, immigration this year will be much larger than ever before. Since the 1st of January, 2,300 have arrived at Baltimore as against 239 for the same period last year and 35,025 have arrived at New York against 1,114 for 1879. During March last, the number of arrivals was 21,658 against 5,965 last year. It is said these immigrants are an unusually good class of people, most of them having sufficient money for a good start in life.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 8.—Later returns show more Liberal gains. Three hundred Liberal gains. Three hundred Liberals have been elected, 191 Conservatives and 39 Home Rulers.

The *Daily News* says: There can be no doubt but the country has declared not only in favor of the Liberals, but for Gladstone as the Chief of the Government. If the Queen does not send for Gladstone the first thing, Lord Granville or the Marquis of Hartington, or whoever receives the royal commission, must wait on Gladstone.

Ex-Empress Eugenie, before starting for Zululand presented her very valuable crown to the church of Notre Dames des Victoires, Paris.

The Emperor has replied by the following Cabinet order to Bismarck's request for permission to retire from office: "I certainly do not ignore the difficulties in which you may be placed by conflict between duties imposed upon you by the constitution and your responsibility. I do not feel inclined to relieve you of your office, because you believe yourself unable, in a particular case, to carry out the task allotted to you by the Constitution. I must, on the contrary, leave it to you to submit to me and subsequently to the Bundesrath proposals, calculated to bring about a constitutional solution of the conflict of duties of this description."

Addur Bahman Khan has reached Ghazi on the road to Chankhar. He has written to Kohistaust to join him, and already 3,000 irregulars have left in obedience to this order.

The German Emperor had a long conference with the Crown Prince, at which it was determined that Bismarck should remain in office.

LONDON, 9.—The Spanish congress has approved 22 clauses of the Cuban budget.

A printing office at Smolensk has been closed by the police and one of the proprietors arrested. Papers compromising the establishment were discovered when the last se-

cret press was seized in St. Petersburg.

The *Golos* states: A special council is sitting to define the rights of governors general in relation to the supreme commission, the object being to restrict the independent action of permanent and temporary governors general and bring them more under the control of General Melnikoff and the Minister of the Interior.

LONDON, 10.—A Burmah correspondent says: Mandalay astrologers maintain that in order to remove evil influences, a great propitiation sacrifice is requisite. The victims must be taken from all ranks to the number of 100. The priests contribute 100 victims, men women and children. Many arrests are made to secure a sufficient number of the victims to be selected from. Priests who have hitherto enjoyed immunity from sacrifices are quitting Mandalay in great numbers. A Catholic convent was entered to procure victims from among the girls there, but the attempt was frustrated. The internal condition of the country is most unsatisfactory. The people, while seeing the folly of King Theobaw's acts, are helpless to effect a change.

A telegram from the Russian consul at Van, Armenia, appeals for aid to save the inhabitants of that district from annihilation. The famine is increasing; 150 persons have died of starvation at Agbak. In the villages girls are dying by the hundred. The Russian authorities at Castoff have forwarded 50,000 pounds of flour to Van.

The elections in England have produced a profound impression in Constantinople, and at the Palace almost a panic. Greeks, Armenians, Bulgarians and Christians rejoice at Beaconsfield's fall. The more sanguine assume that Gladstone will turn Turkey out of Europe bag and baggage.

The Porte has a telegram from the Prince of Montenegro raising difficulties regarding the text of the treaty for the settlement of the Gussinje and Plava affair.

Jules Strasser, cashier of the Rothschild's, is in Vienna, arrested for embezzlement. He lost half a million florins in speculations on the Bourse. His brothers are all arrested.

Nothing has yet transpired to show how Bismarck proposes to remedy the evil on account of which he resigned; but it is expected that as president of the Bundesrath, he will make a motion for an authentic interpretation of the articles of the constitution affecting the delivery of votes.

A Havana dispatch says: The cane on the Paso Real plantation, near Trinidad, has been burned. The loss will be 200 hogsheds of sugar. The drought continues and cattle are dying from it in the Vuelta Abajo region.

LONDON, 12.—Louis Blanc condenses the result of the election into one phrase, declaring the liberal victory is a triumph of political morality. The English Tories, calumniating their own country, circulate the wildest fictions in explanation of their defeat, even alleging that the constituencies have been bought with Russian gold. Utter confusion reigns in the Tory camp. Eminent men, heretofore reckoned sane, are pronouncing the country ruined, its prestige gone, its influence in European councils sacrificed, and that revolution is impending at home. The truth is this success restores to power the leaders who are intensely jealous of the honor and glory of England, and are pledged to maintain not her ascendancy but her just influence abroad, while the majority of the new house, though overwhelmingly liberal, it is computed will contain a preponderance of moderate men. The net liberal gains exclusively Home Rulers, exceeded a hundred seats. The clear liberal majority over Tories and Home Rulers combined is about forty. Not since 1835 have the Tories been so weak numerically and so discredited morally. The Tory journals devote themselves to inventing ingenious theories to account for the defeat—depression in trade, bad harvests, democratic caprice, Liberal misrepresentations and many other fictitious causes are assigned. The real cause is the profound dissatisfaction of the people with Lord Beaconsfield's policy and method of government. Lord Beaconsfield himself appealed to the country to support the principle of English ascendancy in Europe and Asia. Other causes contributed in a minor degree, but this was the main element in the controversy, which weariness of sham imperialism was the chief faction. The

Queen's continued absence occasions sharp comments. A Baden letter describes the Queen as exasperated against Beaconsfield, alleging that he deceived her respecting the real feeling of the country and alienated the most loyal portion of her dominion.

About Rahman Khan is still at Kundz. It is expected if the Afghan tribes make a stand, the place chosen will probably be between Saabju and Mukee. The principal chiefs belonging to the opposition party at Ghuzner have arrived from Maulan. Differences among the chiefs prevent a unanimous opinion. The son and heir, only a few months old, and the brother of the late King, have both died.

Seven hundred men, boys, women, girls, priests and foreigners were sacrificed at Mandalay for the restoration of the King's health. They were buried alive, not burned, under the towers of the city walls.
