P. 362.

There has never been a successful attempt to controvert the history or the doctrine contained in the Book of Mormon, but all the discoveries of travelers and antiquarians confirm the historical part, while the Bible sustains the doctrinal part of the Book which is a blessing to the believing and a stumbling block to the skeptical and worldly wise of the nineteenth century.

We are pleased to note the continued success of this admirable institution and hope that its prosperity may continue undiminished.

To the Stockholders of the United Order Manufacturing and Building Company of Logan.

Our sixth annual statement, which I have pleasure in presenting, shows both growth and profit in the company's business.

From the profits of the business the directors have been careful to set aside a sufficient amount—crediting the same to the account of real estate and mill property—to make good any possible depreciation in values, or wear and tear.

The first cost of our real estate, mill property and machinery is \$36,414.81. This account is reduced from the profits of the business of 1880 and 1881 to \$21,051.01, a discount of \$15,363.80, or 42½ per cent. of the first cost. When it is remembered that three-fourths at least of the value called for in this account is situated in Logan City, where property has risen in value rather than depreciated, it will clearly appear that we do not estimate this resource too high, indeed the directors feel satisfied that one-half of this discount will more than cover all depreciations whatsoever. In addition to this we carry to reserve fund \$1,512.50, which added to previous reserve, \$1,790.17, makes a total reserve of \$3,302.67.

The following exhibit gives the resources and liabilities for the year ending December 31st, 1881, after having discounted our real estate and mill property, as previously stated:

This shows a profit of 27.3-7 per cent. on \$23,000, which amount is the average of capital stock for the year.

The directors have declared a 12 per cent cash dividend and a 5 per cent stock dividend, and 2 per cent. merchandise will be paid on "trade checks" to all patrons of the U. O. Store.

The cash dividend is made payable in May next, but can be drawn

at once in merchandise if desired from any of the company's institutions. The stock dividend will be credited to the respective stock accounts, and the dividend on "trade checks" will be paid at once in merchandise from U. O. Store. Dividends paid in six years 116 per cent.

The principal business during the year was done by U. O. Store, it having sold goods to the amount of \$101,528.59.

Our wholesale purchases have been chiefly from Logan Branch Z. C. M. I., we having paid this house over \$50,000 during the year.

The sales in lumber yard for the year have been \$45,436.86. The sales in furniture store, \$19,655.73. The business done in railroad ties is \$22,000. The dairy made \$2,054.89 worth of cheese.

The total business done in all departments is \$202,459.29.

We have sold goods in U. O. store at an average gross profit of 15 per cent. net profits on sales 9.810 per cent.

In the lumber yard, the gross profits on sales have been 12½ per cent., the net profits 5 per cent.

In the furniture store, gross profits 18½ per cent, net profits 12 per cent.

Taking an average of the whole year, the company has employed 130 men and 70 teams.

The total of our inventories of stock in trade is \$30,155.57. This is about \$5,000 more than our entire indebtedness, which would leave us the real estate, mill property and machinery, \$21,000 (in round numbers) and \$18,000 in cash and accounts, a total of \$39,000 to cover your investments in capital stock, which calls for but \$29,000.

With a view of opening new industries—erecting some necessary store buildings in Logan, and as far as possible to buy goods and pay cash down, it is proposed to change our articles of association so that our capital stock shall be increased from \$30,000 to \$50,000. If this proposition shall be adopted, the directors propose to open the books for subscriptions to capital stock, giving the present stockholders the exclusive privilege of subscribing for said stock for the next 30 days, after which all stock not taken will be sold at par to such subscribers and in such amounts as may be approved by the Directors.
