# SAFE ROBBED IN HEART OF TOWN

Daring Burglars Loot Rowe & Kelly's Strong Box in Early Evening.

## THEY SECURE \$300 IN MONEY

Mining Stock and Endorsed Checks Also Missing—Thieves Escape And Leave No Clue.

Another daring safe cracking job and robbery occurred last evening between 6 and 9 o'clock, this one right in the heart of the business district of the city and at a time when hundreds of persons including police officers, were passing the scene of operations. The place entered by the cracksmen was Rowe & Kelly's clothing store, 122-134 South Main street. The safe was wrecked by the use of nitro-glycerine and \$300 in money, \$3,000 in mining stock and some valuable papers were taken by the crooks. The robbers escaped without leaving a clue for the police to work on.

The mining stock stolen belongs to W. T. Rowe. A number of checks, endorsed by the firm were taken by the thieves and the public has been warned not to cash them. Among other things taken was a silver watch valued at \$5 and a gold ring worth \$5.

## DONE EARLY IN EVENING.

The daring burglary was undoubtedly committed between 6 and 9 o'clock, and the cracksmen were well acquainted with the movements of the store at the time of closing, the interior arrangements and were also informed as to the time Night Watchman George F. Houghan makes his rounds.

## DISCOVERED BY NIGHTWATCH.

The robbery was discovered by Mr. Houghan shortly after 9 o'clock and the alarm was immediately given. Chief Pitt, Capt. Burbridge and several detectives and officers hurried to the scene and started to work on the case, but the wreckage left by the daring cracksmen was the only clue.

At 9 o'clock Houghan began his rounds and tried the front door and found it securely locked. A short time later he went to the rear and then found the door had been forced open. The robbers had to go through two doors to gain entrance. The first was easily pushed open and the second which had been secured by an iron rod was smashed in.

## KNOCKED OFF COMBINATION.

The robbers evidently lost no time in getting to work on the safe. They tried the front door and found it securely locked. A short time later he went to the rear and then found the door had been forced open. The robbers had to go through two doors to gain entrance. The management of the Rowe & Kelly company request that all persons having checks at the store on Monday will kindly call, so that the firm can check up on the number endorsed, and those not endorsed. About \$250 of endorsed checks were stolen, and in the neighborhood of \$100 worth which were not endorsed, and parties who brought in checks on Monday can assist in a great deal in straightening the matter out by calling and giving the information desired.

## GRAZING DISCUSSED.

Forest Inspector Benedict Meets Wool Growers at Provo.

Forest Inspector Benedict returned last evening from a conference at Provo with local wool growers over grazing privileges, and the number of sheep to be permitted to graze on a reserve. The inspector states his belief that the claim that cattle will run where sheep have been grazing does not hold good, as he found out by experience on the Utah reservation that cattle would drift over to where sheep were feeding, after feed on their own section became scarce. Moreover, at the Provo conference, cattlemen were willing to have their sheep graze with the sheep, and the sheepmen did not object if the cattle were not allowed to bunch together in large herds.

## RETURNS FROM MEXICO.

C. H. Miller Says There Are 16,000 Americans in Aztec Capital.

C. H. Miller has just returned from a month's trip through Old Mexico. Mr. Miller was formerly a freight conductor on the Mexican Central, running between Aguas Calientes and Tampico, and speaks the language of the country, and the language of the vernacular. He says the bathing was so fine in the Gulf of Mexico at Tampico that he remained in the water for two hours, and then didn't want to come out. Mr. Miller says he saw a great many Americans in the City of Mexico and prominent northern points. He found 16,000 Americans in the Mexican capital, with a large part of the directors of the various industries and the American daily papers. Americans are flocking into the country in large numbers, taking up land in all directions. Interesting themselves in the country, Mr. Miller says land he could have bought 10 years ago, for \$1.25 per acre, he now would have to pay \$10 and \$15 for uncultivated. He found that many so-called unhealthful tracts were in a condition because of decaying vegetation; but says that when the lands are cleared, and the soil turned over, these unhealthful conditions disappear. Americans are extensively engaged in raising sugar cane, rubber, and fruits of all kinds, to say nothing of immense quantities of cotton. He also found that Mr. Miller accompanied his husband on his Mexican pilgrimage.
