

## GETTING INTO PORT ARTHUR.

A War Correspondent Tells How  
He Finally Got Into the  
Great Fortress.

### A DANGEROUS UNDERTAKING.

Success Crowned His Efforts—Says  
The Russians Are Not at  
All Discouraged.

Liao Yang, May 15.—Nemirovich Danchenko, the Russian war correspondent in the service of the Associated Press, concludes his personal narrative of his escape from Port Arthur, the first part of which was cable to the Associated Press yesterday, as follows:

"Having reached the flaming village of Wafandian, I wished to proceed thence to Port Arthur and afterwards to Zassatch eastward. With nightfall from the hills, outlined against the blaze of fire, shots were heard occasionally. The locomotives showed no signs of starting. The Chinese approached us with complaints against the governor, who had executed eight more of our friends. The Chinese, frightened, huddled around our campfire. The telegraph wire was working all right with headquarters. At daybreak a monster ammunition train, drawn by several engines, arrived. It was essential to take that train through to Port Arthur, an exceptionally dangerous undertaking in view of the reappearance of the enemy. Two squadrons of frontier guards were sent out to reconnoiter the neighborhood. The cars were armed by a double row of rails, against rifle fire and had on board a company of Balkan engineers.

"A locomotive was sent ahead to act as a scout, in charge of Lieut. Zavadsky, who acted as engineer, and Lieut. Van Roon, two armed stokers and the correspondent of the Associated Press. Our mission was to signal the train which was following 10 minutes behind. It was a very dangerous task, in which case the train would have been blown up by the Russian snipers. The train, with a force of officers and men of the Amur railroad battalion, had come over the damaged line, repairing it as it came, gave the signal and we moved off with the engine swathed in cloud smoke, from the burning station of Wafandian.

"As we drew close on both sides were covered with the family of the hills. In the distance and occasional glimpses of the emerald sea. Chinese villages and miniature gardens alone relieved the monotony of the picturesque scene. The typhoon had ceased and there was nothing to prevent the enemy's landing. Doubtless it was proceeding not far away.

"We saw Chinese women and children fleeing with their family valuables. We eagerly scanned the treacherous nooks and corners of the hills, where the enemy might be lurking. A single success shot from a hidden battery might blow up the monster train before it had time to get to the beach.

"The charred station house was as desolate as the grave. We overlooked the cavalry scouts and thereafter set out on our own outposts. We found the bridges, one of which had been repaired by Col. Spiridonoff on the previous day, guarded by our sentries, who reported that the enemy had not appeared. The locomotive steamed on quickly, without encountering any sign of life, as far as Sanshillipou. There the troops were drawn up to meet us. We heard the good news that 30 men who had been surrounded by the enemy the previous day and who had been vainly sought by the Kin Chou guards, had been rescued in breaking through the enemy's line near the beach.

"After again starting we saw a detachment of cavalry in the midst of a cloud of dust near the seashore and stopped to assist them. They were our friends or foes. Through field glasses we recognized Russian uniforms. It was a squadron sent by Gen. Fock to meet and escort us. The soldiers hurried and galloped forward with joyful faces.

"At Kin Chou Gen. Fock and his staff came to offer their congratulations on the accomplishment of such a dangerous and important mission.

"Now that you have left Port Arthur in every sense, we need have no anxiety. The enemy is everywhere, but they missed you," said Gen. Fock. "The general thanked Col. Spiridonoff and the other officers and men, and the train proceeded thence over a well protected line. There was no necessity for us to go any further.

"A telegram came from Port Arthur expressing heartfelt gratitude.

"As we left and resumed our journey to Liao Yang we could hear the blowing of distant explosions caused by the blowing up of the piers, docks and quays of Port Arthur.

"On our way north we sighted a detachment of Japanese cavalry. The enemy continued landing troops at Han Chou, near Cape Terminal, driving out the Chinese.

"The feeling of confidence at Liao Yang is not impaired by the apparent temporary checks to the Russian army, which, it is claimed, cannot alter the final outcome. Let Russia, it is added, not give way to excitement, but look forward cheerfully.

"Fresh troops are arriving uninterruptedly. The Russian soldiers have a splendid appearance. They are greatly superior to the troops from the central Russian provinces.

"Liao Yang is packed with supplies. The Russian commanders do not believe the enemy will prove very energetic. They think the Japanese move against Port Arthur was a ruse and that their chief attack is intended to be made on Liao Yang.

## THE WIVES WON.

New York, May 16.—Hunger has driven some members of the Husband Anti-Euchre society of Bayonne, N. J., into retreat, and the president has resigned. His office is still vacant and the wives who were to be cured of playing euchre six afternoons a week seem to have more than held their ground. In his letter of resignation the head of the reform movement declares that since he became so active in his efforts to suppress the ladies' amusement, his wife appears to have forgotten how his stomach he is compelled to resign. ### To Boycott Directory.

Chicago, May 16.—The Chicago Federation of Labor has adopted a resolution requesting members of unions affiliated with it to refuse to permit their names to appear in the forthcoming city directory. It is charged in the resolution that the city publishing the directory has "publicly expressed opposition to organized labor in general in its efforts to maintain a so-called 'open shop'."

### A MIDSHIPMAN DROWNED.

Boat in Which He and Others Were Peasantry Riding Capsized.

Annapolis, Md., May 15.—Midshipman Philip Brittingham of Wheeling, W. Va., a member of the third class of the naval academy, was drowned about two miles from the naval academy this afternoon. The young man left the academy dock in a sailing launch with Midshipmen Anderson, Henderson, Towles and Stevenson, all of the third class. The boat was without canvas, and the four midshipmen were caught by a strong gust of wind, capsized and sank immediately. The five young men struggled in the water for about 20 minutes before succor reached them from another academy boat containing several other midshipmen. As the rescuing sailboat came near, oars were used by the struggling men, but Midshipman Brittingham was unable to grasp his.

Midshipman C. T. Blackburn, who was in the second boat, plunged overboard and made heroic attempts to rescue his drowning classmate. He was dragged under. Both came to the surface and Midshipman R. R. Stewart bravely went to Blackburn's assistance. Their combined efforts proved unavailing and Brittingham sank in 17 feet of water. The other four midshipmen were picked up and the rescuers dove overboard in repeated but unsuccessful efforts to find the body. Midshipman Brittingham was 19 years of age and a son of Rev. Joseph Brittingham.

### Francis Joseph's Speech.

Budapest, May 15.—In a speech at the reception of the delegations today Emperor Francis Joseph said:

"Our relations with all the powers are permanently excellent. Our firmly established connection with our allies, supplemented by a close understanding with Russia regarding questions in the Balkans, fills us with confidence in the peaceful development of affairs on our continent.

"The work of reform in certain villages of European Turkey, carried out in accordance with the Mevrist program (the Austro-Russian scheme of reforms in Macedonia) is making the most satisfactory progress.

"A most regrettable event is the war which is raging in the far east, which has already caused great sacrifice of life. May it please divine providence to confine its murderous conflict within the narrowest possible limits of time and space, and again bestow upon the world the inestimable blessing of peace."

The speech referred to the extraordinary credits by which the emperor declared, the preparedness of the military and naval forces of the monarchy for war will be increased and at the same time the economic interest be promoted. The speech was greeted with great enthusiasm.

### Odell Explains Veto.

Albany, N. Y., May 15.—Gov. Odell tonight gave out his memorandum explaining his veto of a bill enlarging the scope and powers of the Niagara, Lockport & Ontario Power company. He calls attention to the widespread solicitude expressed in protests from all over the Union as to the created impairment of the beauty of Niagara Falls. "The legislature should protect the falls rather than increase the menace, by restricting those corporations which are already in possession and by compelling the removal of obstructions and unsightly structures which mar the beauty of Niagara."

### Successful Balloon Trial.

Paris, May 15.—Santos-Dumont today made a successful half-hour trial with his balloon, No. 2, which he will take to the St. Louis exposition.

### Devourk Symphonies Found.

London, May 16.—A dispatch to the Daily Chronicle from Vienna says that three symphonies have been found among the manuscript of the late Dr. Antoine Devourk.

## RUSSIA FEARS THE CHINESE.

Very Apprehensive Now That They  
May Yet Join Their Forces  
With Japan.

### USING INFLUENCE AT PEKIN.

Strong Representations Made on the  
Necessity of Suppressing an Impending  
Uprising in Tapadziatski.

St. Petersburg, May 15.—In view of the official dispatches regarding the hostile attitude of the Chinese within and without the Russian sphere of influence, the authorities here do not conceal their apprehension as to the outlook, especially in the north of the empire, for they purpose to call the attention of the Celestial Government to the impending uprising in Tapadziatski in order that repressive measures may be instantly taken.

It is known and appreciated here that all the powers have made strong representations to Pekin in the interest of the preservation of the tranquility of the empire, but it is stated that Maj. Gen. Phug's dispatch of May 11 shows the necessity for further urging the Celestial Government with the advisability of acting with a firm hand.

The authorities here do not forget that the Boxer revolt, which spread from Shan Tsin, would have involved the entire empire had it not been for the firmness of the southern viceroys. The military authorities in St. Petersburg claim to have information of a sensational character to the effect that the Chinese have tacitly agreed to co-operate with the Japanese operations against the Russians. The Japanese propose, it is stated, to drive Gen. Kurapatkin from Mongolia, which would place the Russians in the position of invaders of neutral territory and enable reprisals by Gen. Ma's army, which, it is asserted, is kept in that region for special object, thus cleverly avoiding the slightest infringement of the neutrality of China by Japan, and the Chinese troops, by not crossing the Manchurian frontier, could not be charged with a violation of pledges in respect to non-interference in military operations in Manchuria.

The opinion of an eminent strategist given to the Associated Press today is that the Chinese intend to attack not only Liao Yang, but all along the line, in an effort to drive Gen. Kurapatkin into Mongolia, where the Chinese are waiting for him.

Knowing these conditions, Gen. Kurapatkin, he says, would not be likely to make serious resistance at Kai Ping or Hai Cheng, but would withdraw to the north.

This would enable the Japanese to march on Noychwang with little hindrance and their unopposed use of that point as a base from which men and supplies could be sent north without any violation of the neutrality of the Liao river.

### WENTZ'S FATHER.

He Says He Did Not Charge Jury  
With Improper Conduct.

Bristol, Tenn., May 15.—The coroner's jury, which rendered a verdict of accidental shooting in the case of Edward L. Wentz, whose dead body was found in Wise county, Virginia, several days ago, today received a reply from Dr. J. S. Wentz regarding his alleged criminal charge in relation to the finding of the jury. Dr. Wentz makes an apology to the jury, declaring that he did not use such terms as were credited to him in the press dispatches. Dr. Wentz was credited with intimating that the verdict was intended to shield the murderers of his son, who were friends of the jury.

### Elevator Constructors' Strike.

Philadelphia, May 15.—Because the 700 elevator constructors now on strike in this city for increased wages and the right to go out on sympathetic strike have been ignored, it is claimed by the master elevator builders, the national board of the elevator construction is contemplating an international strike. President Samuel Gompers and First Vice President James Duncan of the American Federation of Labor will meet the national board of elevator men here on Tuesday, when the question will be determined. The strike in this city is against the combination of elevator builders, which controls 75 per cent of the work in the world. The bone of contention is the sympathetic strike principle.

Members of the national board said tonight that they had cabled the elevator constructors in London, Berlin and Paris and had received assurances from London and Berlin that the men there will strike if asked to. The men in these cities are not affiliated with the union in this country, but are employed by the combination which controls elevator construction in the United States.

An officer of Morris, Williams & Co., who are the combination, said tonight that the employers are aware of the intention of the strikers and added that nearly all the independent elevator builders have joined the combination for the purpose of fighting the sympathetic strike principle.

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## W. R. HEARST WILL SUPPORT NOMINEE

No Matter Whom the Democrats  
Name He Will Not Bolt  
The Ticket.

### RIDICULES THE VERY IDEA.

He is for Men Who Have Been Democ-  
rats Consistently for Twenty  
Years.

Washington, May 14.—William R. Hearst will support the nominee of the St. Louis Democratic convention, whatever he may be. He today authorized the Washington Post to make this statement unequivocally. He ridiculed a story sent from Albany that he and Mr. Bryan, Arthur Brisbane, Weaver of Iowa and others were planning a huge bolt and the formation of a new party. He said he had been making his fight for the nomination in the name of progressive Democracy, but his fight had been within party lines and would continue to be so. Whatever the result, he intended personally and through his newspapers to support the regular ticket.

"I am for the St. Louis nominee," said Mr. Hearst to the Post. Having uttered that plain spoken sentence, he added with a smile:

"I should, of course, like any other man, to honor and gratified should the Democrats see fit to nominate me. But I do not have to be bribed by office to be a Democrat. I have supported the Democratic ticket in the last five campaigns. I supported Cleveland three times and Bryan twice. I intend to support the nominee of the party at St. Louis, whoever he may be."

The interview was prompted by the Albany dispatch which said that Mr. Hearst, Mr. Bryan, Mr. Brisbane and a few others were preparing to bolt. "I have not been able," he said, "to deny all the foolish things that have been said about me. I have not even kept up with all that has been said, but all the fool things, that is 'foolish' than all the rest," and Mr. Hearst indulged in a hearty laugh at the new adjective he had coined.

"I have been making my fight for the nomination in the name of progressive Democracy," he said. "I have been making my fight on party lines."

An inquiry was made about the significance of the several contests Hearst delegations over the country. "Every state convention of both parties has contested delegates," said Mr. Hearst. "Contests do not mean that bolting will follow. Some of my friends have instituted contests for delegates. In certain cases contests have been instituted by my friends, in entire sincerity on their part, which I would not have sanctioned had the matter come to my knowledge in time. But these contests can be settled in the usual way, as they are settled in every national convention. Please make it plain that I stand for the verdict of loyal Democrats, men who have been loyal to the party and have not been Democrats at pleasure. I am for men who have been Democrats consistently for 20 years."

But suppose the cases you suggest as disloyal should be in control at St. Louis?

"I think there is no danger of that. It is safe to trust the Democratic masses," was the answer.

"But they would be the people who sent these men to the convention in a majority," to which remark he assented. Nevertheless, he expressed the belief that loyal Democrats would be in control at St. Louis and reiterated his intention to support the nominee of the convention. In fact, his utterances were so direct and emphatic on that point that no room was left to doubt Mr. Hearst's loyalty and his intention to prosecute his campaign for the nomination within the party lines, and not only to abide by the result, no matter what it might be, but to work for the ticket nominated.

## RUSSIAN FLEET SCORES A SUCCESS

Torpedoes and Cripples Armored  
Japanese Cruiser, But Does  
Not Sink It.

### DONE WITH NAPHTHA LAUNCH.

Mounted a Small Machine Cannon  
And Carried Three  
Torpedoes.

Liao Yang, Saturday, May 14.—(Delayed in transmission)—The Russian fleet scored its first distinct naval success of the war on May 13 by torpedoing and crippling, though not the sinking of an armored Japanese cruiser in Tallenwan bay.

Liao Yang, Saturday, May 14.—The Russian attack was carefully planned on May 10 while the Japanese squadron was concentrated outside Dainy devoting its whole attention to Tallenwan bay, and was carried out the same night.

The attacking force was not a regular torpedo boat but was only a small naphtha launch in command of a young naval officer, who had with him three jacksies. The launch mounted a small machine gun and carried three torpedoes.

When darkness fell the launch crept out of Port Arthur, hugging the shore with no lights aboard and no glow from the engine to betray her presence. It was when the launch sailed the outer line of the Japanese squadron, slipping through the torpedo boat pickets and selecting the nearest warship, a big armored cruiser, she stole toward her and succeeded in exploding against her side a single torpedo.

A deafening roar followed the explosion which echoed far ashore. Immediately flames enveloped the cruiser, which evidently was badly crippled.

The crew of the cruiser was soon to be fighting the fire, which they at last succeeded in extinguishing. A sloop took the damaged vessel in tow and disappeared to the southeast.

The launch escaped the hot fire directed against her by the Japanese ships, but, being unable to return to Port Arthur, she was forced to Dainy, where she was beached not far from Dainy.

Only a few of the higher officers were aware of the plan, the success of which depended upon secrecy. The achievement raised the spirits of the Russians, and ashore and aboard the young naval officer who was the hero of the exploit was feted and recommended for the Cross of St. George.

The Russians on May 11, apprehending that the presence of a Japanese squadron meant to attempt to capture Dainy, blew up the piers and quietly evacuated the place.

Two thousand Japanese have reconquered the road to Sanphillip, again cutting off Port Arthur. A strong force is advancing against Polaudien.

### Alonso Bristow Robbed.

Chicago, May 16.—Alonso Bristow of Bedford, Iowa, has reported to the police the loss of \$10,750 which he received from the sale of 82 horses at the Union stock yards. He says the money was in a small satchel and that the thief shadowed the side of the bag with a knife, thereby enabling him to insert his hand and purloin the two packages of greenbacks.

The robbery apparently occurred while Bristow was on his way from a hotel to the Union depot, where he intended to take a train for Iowa. The satchel was not out of his hands, he says, from the time the money was put in it until he discovered the loss.

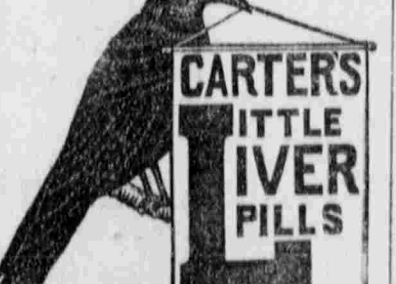
