ALLIES SIGN THE PROTOCOLS

They Provide for the Immediate Raising of Blockade.

ARE IN THREE LANGUAGES.

Germany Gets Preferential Payment of \$340,000 - Venezuela's Vessels Captured in War to be Returned.

Washington, Feb. 13 .- Herbert W. Bowen, Venezuelan representative in the peace negotiations at Washington, tonight signed with each of the allies representatives a protocol providing for the immediate raising of the blockade and for the reference of the question of preferential treatment of the claims of the allies against Venezuela to the Hague arbitration tribunal.

The final formalities occurred at the British embassy. At 11:30 o'clock tonight Herbert Deering, first secretary of the British embassy, announced to the Associated Press that the British protocol had just been signed and that the signatures of the Itahan and German protocols would follow in the order

The Italian protocol was signed at 11:50 o'clock, and the German protocol at 12:10 o'clock, the presence of Baron Sternberg at the White House musicale delaying a final close to the negotia-tions until after midnight. The British protocol was in English, the Italian in Italian and the German in German and English. Mr. Eowen signed in dupli-cate for Venezuela, Sir Michael Herbert for Great Britain, Signor Mayor des Planches for Italy, and Baron Speck von Sternberg for Germany.

Immediately on the signing of the last protocol cables were dispatched to London, Berlin and Rome announcing the fact. It is expected that the com-manders of the blockading fleet with-in the next 24 hours will receive their orders to withdraw their vessels at
