A general meeting of the farmers, which include representatives from every district in Weber, Boxelder from every district in Weber, Boxelder and Davis counties where beets are grown for the Ogden factory, was held yesterday at the Weber club. David Eccles was present as the representa-tive of the Amalgamated Sugar com-nany. The question was presented starely to the farmers by the company and it was for them to decide whether they should have the old contract with by should have the old contract, with pay of \$4.50 per ton for beets, or the contract known as the Lehi contract, with \$4.75 for beets.
