RECOVERED FROM MINE. Birmingham, Ala., Feb. 22,-At 8

o'clock this evening 75 blackened and disfigured bodies had been recovered from the Virginia mine, in which the awful explosion occurred on Monday afternoon, entombing more thun 150 of the best miners in the Birmingham

district. Tomorrow will be a day of funerals at Virginia City, Bessemer, Pratt City and Engley. The men have been taken to Bessemer as ast as identified. An extra supply of coffins from neighbor-ing cities arrived today. The rescuers are still heroically at work in the slope, and as the diggers advance the bodies further in the mine are found to be worse burned and mu-tilated than those nearer the exterior. No hope is now held out that any of the men can be alive. Three men were found yesterday whose hearts were still found yesterday whose hearts were still beating, but they expired immediatly on reaching the outside air.

battle with the savages in the moun-tains east of this camp. When the fight ended Gen. Torres, with his staff, two-thirds of his force and the pris-oners returned to La Colorado. The Mexican officers refused to make any statement of their own losses un-til they make their official report, but private soldlers of the force who took part in the fight say they were incon-siderable, although there were sick and wounded among the returning troops. It is said there were 300 warriors in the band surrounded by Torres in the Mazatian mountains. About 100 of these broke through the Mexican lines and escaped, but the main force was hurled at a detachment commanded by Capt. Barron, an old Yaqui fighter who was guarding one of the mountain passes. passes. He succeeded in holding the savages in check until the arirval of reinforce-ments, when the Indians were driven back with heavy loss and finally sur-rendered. The final onslaught had been preceded by two days of skirm-ishing, the troops were worn out, the rians had set in, and Torres decided to withdraw to La Colorado with his pris-oners, abandoning the pursuit of those

withdraw to La Colorado with his pris-oners, abandoning the pursuit of those who had escaped. He left garrisons at all the small towns and ranches which had been abandoned, and ex-pects to return to the same district if the Yaquis who escaped continue to cause trouble.
