## CANVASS OF RETURNS

William Driver Will Contest the Seating of W. R. Emmett, Who Has But 2 Majority.

## GREEK ROBBERS NOW IN JAIL.

Self Confessed Desperadoes - Lively Fight in Japanese Restaurant - City Council Session.

John Volopos and his brother Jim, two Greeks, are now incarcerated in the county jail, with a charge of robbery hanging over them. They are the two men who Saturday evening, held up and robbed a fellow countryman named Gus Moritz, of \$125 at the point of a shotgun and sharp pointed knife. John was arrested Sunday evening, but Jim escaped from the officers. Moritz says the two men learned that he had some money and with the shot gun poked him in the ribs knocking him down. John held a knife against his throat and told him that if he moved they would kill him and Jim went through his pockets securing the money. Moritz laid on the ground as if dead until his assailants left, and then he called the alarm. Sheriff Bailey and Deputy Shaw arrested John and chased Jim for several miles, he carrying a shotgun. Sheriff Bailey and Deputy Shaw followed Jim until he was in the brush on the West river bank west of West Weber and could not be located as night fell. Sheriff Bailey and Deputy Shaw went to West Weber to get some food and was caught. Jim is said to be a very dangerous character. According to his brother's statement he killed three men in Greece and burned a church before coming to America and would not doubt have killed Moritz had he made a move Saturday.

## ELECTION RETURNS CANVASSED.

The Ogden city council met in special session yesterday afternoon and canvassed the election returns. They found the result the same as was published in the "News" the day after election with the exception of the election of W. R. Emmett, Democrat, according to the count received two more votes than William Driver, both of these gentlemen had been in the race for the same office. It is understood that Mr. Driver will contest the vote and will make application to the district court for the opening of the ballot boxes of the Fifth ward and a recount of the ballots, as he has been informed that in one precinct the judges made a miscount which was against him.

## CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Mayor Glasman recommended that an appropriation of a building site be made to the Salvation Army for the erection of a shelter and home for the tramp and hobo element. The matter was referred to the law committee. An ordinance was passed creating first election east to curbing and gutting district No. 1. Three applications for liquor license were submitted, and were granted, and all licenses issued to date by the recorder were ratified and approved by the council.

Claims and pay rolls were allowed aggregating \$2,955.90 besides \$680 on account of draining cemetery along Twentieth street, and \$1,890.75 on account of contract with J. P. O'Neil for street paving. The health report was submitted showing three cases of diphtheria and one case of smallpox in quarantine. The official canvass of the election returns was being showing a result in favor of the following persons: Mayor, Wm. Glasman; Recorder, W. J. Critchlow; Auditor, Hattie L. Brown; Treasurer, James E. Halverson; Atty. Jas. E. Bailey; Municipal Judge, J. A. Howell; Councilmen, First ward, E. B. Patten and T. H. Carr; Second ward, Alex. Moxes and J. E. Williams; Third ward, Wm. Craig and H. P. Randall; Fourth ward, F. W. Christensen; Fifth ward, Rollo Emmett and J. C. Nye.

McGovern was charged with assault and battery and he in return swears to a complaint charging Ishihara with assault.

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Veteran of Early Days Laid to Rest in Ogden Cemetery.

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West Weber, Weber Co., Nov. 6.—On Nov. 1 death came to the relief of Sister Matilda M'Farland, the wife of James M'Farland.

She underwent an operation about nine months ago, which she never fully recovered and was confined to her bed four weeks previous to her death.

She was the daughter of Thomas and Mary M'Farland, and was born March 29, 1833, at Malaga, Spain. She was baptised in 1846, and emigrated from England in 1853, on the ship Ellen Maria, and was among the first settlers in West Weber, where she was married to James M'Farland. She was the mother of 10 children, five sons and five daughters, seven of whom are living. She leaves 27 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren; also her husband and many relatives and friends to cherish her memory.

Her funeral services were held in the Wilson ward meetinghouse on the 3rd last. The speakers were Elders A. M. Parland, Joseph Parry, Thos. Etherton, H. H. Huxley, and James Ririe, each of whom bore testimony to her genial and affectionate disposition both in her family and social life, and the few persons considering the influence and obstacles she had to meet, have done more both for the living and dead than she.

Her remains were buried in the Ogden cemetery.
