THE CURFEW LAW.

George Goddard Makes Some Suggestions Regarding Wayward Boys.

Editor Desert News:

The frequent occurrences of youthful depravity that are recorded in our daily papers, made manifest in the stealing of chickens and other depredations, are very sad to contemplate. It is probable that many of these dishonest practices take place in the dead of night, when most people are supposed to be asleep. It would seem to be unsafe for such things to be attempted during the early hours of the evening.

Last evening's News contains an account of the capture of six boys, engaged in this nefarious practice. The picture of the youth indulging in such crime presents a melancholy fact for parents to reflect upon. It reminds me of an old saying: "Of chickens break a parent's heart; twenty can do no more."

In tracing the account in the paper, another feature of the case is presented. There is no place of confinement where the boys could be sent to after being arrested, which some measure of relief might be obtained by confining them in a place of confinement.

It is suggested that the city fathers should consider the possibility of establishing a place of confinement for such youthful criminals, where not only cleanliness should be observed, but also where the boys could be employed in some useful way, and would add that some kind of employment should be given them, and that they should be given some kind of training.

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THE NOTORIOUS JARMAN.

A Noteworthy Discussion With Him in England.

We take the following from the *Millennial Star* of Nov. 21st:

LONDON, Nov. 4, 1887.

President George Teasdale:

Dear Brother—Knowing the interest which the Saints throughout the world feel respecting the opposition we have to contend with, coming from such sources as the vile press and the wicked and unfeeling brethren, it is prudent to advise you of our experience up to date.

Since the disgraceful affair at Limerick Road, previously reported, Jarman has continued to insult the influence of people in the suburbs of London with highly exhibitions of disgusting scenes and to be found in Utah, which are shown by the aid of high-light and canvas, and to enter into the same with his following.

On Sunday, the 16th ult., he came with a crowd of about two hundred persons to our meeting at Whitechapel. Being forewarned, we had the protection of the police. Mr. Jarman, with many others as our guests would accommodate, and were admitted and seated in the testimonies of Elder Schofield and President Ballard.

At the close of the meeting, he was invited to address the people and create a disturbance, but in that he was not allowed. Since that time he has been following him up and circulating among the people the following:

"FACTS AND QUERIES FOR MR. JARMAN."

1. Utah is a Territory of the United States, and occupies the same relation to that government that a Crown Colony does to England.

2. The President of the United States appoints the Governor of Utah, the Secretary of the Territory, and the district courts, who have jurisdiction in all criminal cases, liable to a fine of \$500 (\$100 for misdemeanors) or imprisonment for not more than six months.

3. The President also appoints the marshal, who executes all his duties and officers of the court, and many others that never occurred only in the heated imagination of our opponents.
