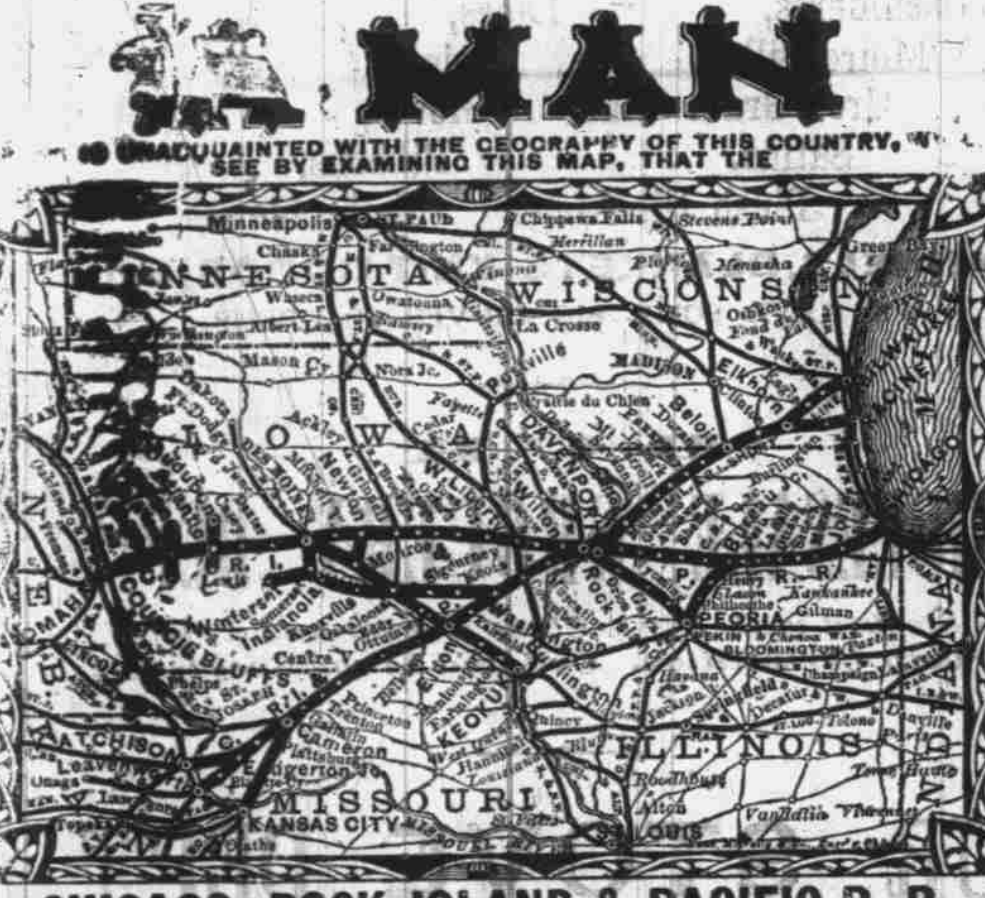

### INTERESTING FROM NORTH CAROLINA.

MORGANTON, Burke, Co., N. C., Oct. 11, 1882.

Editor Deseret News:

We are living at a time when thousands are looking forward to the words of our Elder Brother, viz., "And this Gospel of the Kingdom shall be preached in all the world for witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come," and for the purpose of helping to accomplish this great work, I left my home Jan. 24, 1881, for this field of labor in North Carolina. 3rd.—Lightness of wear. After having threshed 18000 bushels of grain, lucern seed, etc., the general wear on the machine being scarcely perceptible.

4th.—Lightness of running expenses. By comparing notes with our friends of other machines, we find ours have not exceeded half of theirs.

We also consider the capacity for threshing in quantity, superior to other makes of machines, although the farms here are small, necessitating a great deal of moving, and often to distant points, yet we threshed as high as 800 bushels per day.
