"In each county of this state where a school district therein outside of the limits of cities of the first and second cases shall comprise a school popula-tion of more than 3,000 children

sing school district has a school pop-ulation of more than 3,000, that this act is applicable, otherwise not. I am informed by the county superin-tendent of schools that there is no school district in Weber county having that number of school children or any-where near that amount, so that there is aching at present to be done in res nothing at present to be done in re-sard to this school law. I am also in-samed by the county school superinendent that the entire school population outside of Ogden city is but a few hundred more than 3,000.

The Bamberger franchise, which was the banberger fractures, which was also granted for 100 years, provides that the car line may enter Ogden at the west end of Thirty-third street, east on Thirty-third to Lincein avenue, north or Lincein successful of the on Lincoln avenue to Twenty-fifth street, east on Twenty-fifth street to Grant avenue, north on Grant avenue to Twenty-first street, east on Twentyfirst street to Monroe avenue north on Monroe to Twentleth street, east on Twentieth street to Jackson avenue, north on Jackson avenue to a point half way between Eighteenth and Nine-teenth streets, thence east along the water grade to the mouth of Ogden

The Bamberger road must charge the same rate of fare from Farmington to Ogden as is charged from Farmington to Salt Lake City. Mr. Bamberger is to commence work on his road within ninety days. His line is at the present time completed to Layton and will be pushed with all expediency to Og-den. He expects to have his road in running order for the summer resort

The Mahler company was granted 24 months in which to commence work, and Mr. Mahler stated that on the approval of the franchise by the mayor, his company would immediately commence the survey of his line, which is to run from Payson on the south to Cache valley on the north.

SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL.

Telephone Franchise Considered-Movement for Free Public Library -Suits for Divorce.

Special Correspondence. Provo, Utah Co., April 4 .-- The coun-

ty commissioners decided at yesterday's meeting to offer, in behalf of the county, 60 acres of land to the state for the new agricultural experiment station, to be established under a law enacted by the last Legislature, and for the maintenance of which \$8,000 was appropriated. The station is to be established in ed. The station is to be established in Weber, Davis, Sait Lake, or Utah coun-ty, and the committee to select the site are the trustees of the Agricultural col-lege, the director of the Utah experi-ment station and the state land board. The Utah county board of commission-ers will advise this committee of its action, and the committee will then investigate the proposed sites, or make selection of a site.

A committee from the Prove Com-mercial club, consisting of J. H. Frisby, James Clove and William D. Roberts, Jr., appeared before the commissioners and urged that body to make an offer tages to the state and the county in having the experiment station located in Utah county, this being a central location of the state, and possessing location of the state, and possessing the needed requirements to make it a desirable home for the station in the way of climate, water and soil. The commissioners had already considered the proposition and were therefore easily induced to accept the views of this committee on the question. The following deputy county fish and game commissioners were appointed:
