AN IDAHO STRIKE.

Fine Body of Ore Opened in the Crown Mine at Big Creek District.

recent developments in the Crown mine on Big Creek, says Boise Statesman, prove to be very import-ant, a body of ore having been struck near the foot wall that is of much better grade than the average of the property. This discovery has been made in the

This discovery has been made in the tunnel being run to cross-cut the great ledge. The tunnel had been driven 196 feet at the date when the last ad-vices for Manager McKenzie left the mine. It had passed through a body of ore carrying great quantities of iron sulphurets and showing good values in word, and had come into an one of citil gold, and had come into an ore of still better grade showing some oxidization.

The tunnel was started near the hanging wall of the vein, at the base of a cliff. It has gained nearly foot for foot, the face now being 185 feet vertically beneath the surface. At the start there was some high grade silver bre. The grade then ran off, but the bre all the way has carried values suf-icient to pay. For the last 35 feet there has been constant improvement and the ore now being found is very

iles. The ore is of a character that will yanide, and it is believed the entire re body can be worked. There is litle or no base metal excepting iron.
