GENERAL.

Chicago.—Washington specials say
the appointment of supervisors of in-
ternal revenue has come to a dead lock,
Secretary McCulloch having absolutely
declined to appoint any persons recom-
mended by Commissioner Rollins un-
less he could dictate the names of an
equal number. This is in pursuance of
a determination on the part of the Pre-
sident to give more active support to
Seymour. There are indications that
the influence of the Post Office Depart-
ment will be used in the same direc-
tion.

Leavenworth.—Gen. Sheridan has is-
sued an order that in consequence of the
recent murder of twenty unarmed citi-
zens in the State of Kansas, and other
acts of open hostility by the Cheyenne
and Arapahoe Indians, that the General
commanding directs the forcible remo-
val of these Indians to their reservations
south of Kansas, and that they be com-
pelled to deliver up the perpetrators of
the outrages. All persons are forbidden
to have any intercourse with or to give
assistance to these Indians till the no-
tice and requirements of this order have
been carried out.

Washington.—The Treasury Depart-
ment, yesterday, received \$50,000 in cus-
toms duties collected at Alaska, being
the first received thence.

New York.—Ebenezer Irving, brother
of Washington Irving, died at Sun-
side yesterday, aged 93.

Professor Alder, author of several
well known German instruction books,
died to-day.

Utica.—Dr. Peters, of the Litchfield
observatory, has discovered a new as-
teroid.

Chicago, 25.—The Times' special says
Attorney General Evarts has indicated
that eight hours constitute a legal day's
work under the law of Congress; and
that upon his return he will submit his
formal opinion denying the right of
the Government to deduct from the
wages as allowed by law.

One of the Washington administra-
tion papers announces that Secretaries
McCulloch, Browning, Welles and
Randall will support Seymour and
Blair, but that Seward has not yet made
up his mind.

Several diseased cattle were traced
to-day to a butcher shop, where they
had been cut up and sold to the inhabi-
tants. One died before it could be
slaughtered. The butcher was not ar-
rested.

Washington.—The President has been
asked to grant leave of absence for nine
days to all the Knights Templars in the
various departments who desire to at-
tend the Triennial Conclave of Knights
Templars of the United States America,
at St. Louis, Sept. 15th. The President
referred the matter to the heads of de-
partments, recommending that the re-
quest be granted.

Columbus, O.—The State Board of
Agriculture has passed a resolution re-
commending the Governor to appoint
three commissioners with power to
adopt measures to prevent the intro-
duction of Texas cattle. The Governor
accordingly made the appointments,
with authority to prosecute all persons
who violate the law passed during the
last session of the Legislature, to pre-
vent the spread of contagious diseases
among cattle.

FOREIGN.

London.—Official dispatches from Lu-
cerne state that there is no truth in the
reported attempt to assassinate Queen
Victoria as published. It appears, how-
ever, that an insane Englishman, named
Woodson, was trying to enter the
Queen's apartment, and was promptly
taken care of.

Dispatches from Calcutta say the
eclipse of the sun was plainly visible
throughout India, except at Bombay.

Berlin.—Count Bismarck was thrown
from his horse to-day, while riding
through his estate in Pomerania; it is
reported that his injuries are not seri-
ous.

A letter from Florence expresses the
opinion that the party recently working
throughout Italy are preparing for an-
other invasion. The sons of Garibaldi
are constantly traveling about the coun-
try holding interviews with leading
Garibaldians. Other circumstances also
point to the probability of such an in-
tention.

A letter from Rome says it is reported
there that Cardinal Bonaparte will be
appointed Archbishop of Blasendorf,
which will make him primate of the
United Greeks.
