FORTY-SEVENTH CONGRESS.

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 30.—On motion of
George, of Oregon, the Senate bill
passed appropriating \$70,000 to re-
imburse Oregon for suppressing the
Modoc Indian war; also to pay Cali-
fornia \$44,000 for like services.

On motion of Knapton, the Senate
bills to reform the civil service and
to prevent official assessments, were
taken from the speaker's table and
referred to the committee on civil
service reform, and leave granted the
committee to report them back at
any time.

On motion of March, of Illinois,
the Senate bill, passed extending the
time for filing claims for horses and
equipment lost by officers or
enlisted men in the service of the
United States, with an amendment
limiting the extension to one year
from the passage of the act.

Dunn, of Arkansas, offered a resolu-
tion amending the rules of the
House so as to provide for a standing
committee on rivers and harbors,
to consist of 15 members, to which
shall be referred all matters per-
taining to the improvement of rivers,
canals and harbors, and which shall
have the same privilege of reporting
as the committee on commerce, as now
accorded to the committee on appropri-
ations. Referred to the committee
on rivers and harbors.

Manning offered a resolution that
the Attorney General be authorized
to employ such clerical and other
personnel as may be necessary for the
appointment of Jas. R. Chalmers,
assistant District Attorney in Mis-
sissippi, and to forward all papers
concerning the matter. The resolu-
tion went over, Hiscok objecting.

The speaker announced Calkins
of Indiana as a member of the civil
service reform committee.

Adjourned till Tuesday.

AMERICAN.

Steel Workers.

ST. LOUIS, 31.—The Amalgamated
Iron and Steel Workers' Union met
last night and decided not to
accept the reduction of wages pro-
posed by the Ore and Steel com-
pany. It is not unlikely, however,
that a compromise will be effected.

Pence.

Advices from Indian Territory,
say Chicago's force has disbanded
and trouble is over for the present.
Part of this band has retreated to
the reservation of the Saco and
Fox Indians, but they are now
scattered and are not in a position
to fight again. Chicago and his force
returned to Okmulgee with the ex-
ception of a few scouts who are still
on the western border.

Explosion.

SAN FRANCISCO, 31.—Portland,
Oregon, dispatch: News is just re-
ceived of an explosion this morning
near Walkerville, Montana, in
which three Chinamen were killed
and three wounded. A quantity of
gunpowder was exploded when it
was thrown out.

TITUVILLE, Pa., 31.—D. H.
Mitchell, ex-mayor of Tituville, is
dead.

Why Page was Beaten.

NEW YORK, 31.—The Times in
an editorial says: San Francisco
papers are busy with the conundrum
of what defeated Congressman Page.
Of three republican journals there
have been written with the subject
it was a tidal wave and California
an insurrection of eastern republicans
against the Chinese question; and
another journalistic authority which
declares the first named as "a laborer,"
declares that Page was beaten be-
cause the people were tired of him
and doubted his political honesty; a
third tackles the problem and says
that the defeat of his bosom friend,
Robeson and Kiefer, was brought
about by his devotion to monopoly
and ring, a democratic newspaper
of San Francisco incidentally re-
marks that the people had "soured
on him," thereby meaning the
gentleman had secured measures
to turn a strong republican district
into a democratic one. As California
questions of all varieties are so
intricate that no average person
can discuss them, it is not presum-
able to discuss them, it may be
added that Page affirms that he
was defeated by howling dema-
gogues, whatever that may mean.

Edmonds.

The Tribune's Washington corre-
spondent declares that he has recently
seen an important conference of in-
fluential republicans in that city,
ostensibly dinner parties, but really
to discuss the presidential candi-
date in 1894.

A Bomb.

The Tammany primary in the
sixth assembly district, was held in
the house of Mrs. Wm. Georgeham.
Shortly before the polls closed, some
person dropped a bomb, which ex-
ploded, blowing the entire front of
the store away. No person was in-
jured.

The Character.

WASHINGTON, 29.—The Indian
Bureau learns that whites are erect-
ing buildings and fencing off pas-
tures in the Cherokee country, Indian
Territory. Commissioner Price, to-
day, orders agent Tuffs, at Muskogee,
to order whites to remove stock
from the reservation within twenty
days, after this the military will be
evoked.

Wired from Washington.

Friends of the Nicaragua Canal
are here in force. They feel en-
couraged by the fact that Captain
Bain has withdrawn his opposi-
tion to the Nicaragua Canal project
and the fact that the Nicaragua
Canal project has not the required
majority in the two houses.

The complaint has extended the
corporate existence of the First Na-
tional Bank of Omaha.

Read Admiral Balch, United
States Navy, will return on Jan-
uary 3d.

The usual orders for the army and
navy to call upon the President
on New Year's day were issued
this morning.

The ways and means committee
this morning issued the consider-
ation of the schedule of wool taking
off the item of manufactured
clothes, shawls, etc., otherwise pro-
vided for. Without deciding upon
the rate, it was partially determined
to increase it from the commission-
ers' report though not up the present
rate.

The public debt reduction in De-
cember will be \$13,000,000.

Rear Admiral Balch, U. S. Navy,
will be retired Jan. 3d.

The usual orders for the army and
navy to call upon the President
on New Year's day were issued
this morning.

The ways and means committee
completed consideration of the
schedule of wool and woolen man-
ufactures, and advanced rates about
ten per cent on the average over
the rates recommended by the tariff
commission. The report which
leaves the rate as fixed by the com-
mission, is reduced about 10 per cent
below existing rates. This ad-
vance was upon woolen cloth and
ready made clothing. The commit-
tee also added the item of endless
belts and belts for printing ma-
chines and presses.

Secretary Chandler has ordered
commandants of the navy yards to
reduce by 10 per cent the number of
men employed in the yards, and ap-
portion for the maintenance of yards
and docks. The class affected by
the order is watchmen, keepers of
fire extinguishing apparatus, and
persons employed in like occupa-
tions. Reductions do not extend to
skilled mechanics and workmen
generally. The effect of the order
will be a reduction of about \$7,000
the monthly expenses of the yard.
