annual European trip, has this to say about the business outlook: "Everybody knows that the financial and business situation has improved during the last few months, and I be-lieve that it will cotinue to improve as confidence, (which had been severe-ly shaken through a number of caus-es) continues to be restored more and more. Judging from the past, the election of Mr. Taft seems a renson-able certainty. The political situation, therefore, ought not to be too much of a disturbing factor, the more so, as the ill-considered attacks on capital generally do not find the same favor with the people as they did a little while ago. The crop prospects are also fair, and the easier money and credit situation should have a favor able influence on the revival of busi-ness generally. Some important mat-ters, especially in relation to the rail-roads, remain to be adjusted) but I look forward to a gradual and steady voturn to normal business activities, and, barring unforeseen events, I ex-pect to find when I come home, two or three months hence, that there will be less idle cars, and less unem-ployed men in Wall street and else-where in the country." Mr. and Mrs. Speyer expect to re-turn to New York in October.

San Francisco, July 14.—A suit in-volving \$36,000.000 worth of bonds, with interest, was filed in the United States circuit court here today by the estate of the late Charles Durkee, a former governor of Utah, against the Southern Pacific Railroad company, the Union Pacific Central Pacific and subsidiary companies, the Central Trust company of New York Farmers' Trust company of New York Farmers' Trust company of New York and E. H. Harriman. The plaintiffs ask the court to require the Southern Pacific company and others named in the suit to make an accounting, and also that a receiver be spointed for the holdings of the de-fendants. Gov. Durkee was chief executive of the territory of Utah in 1865. It is al-leged in the complaint that during the period of construction of the Union Pa-cific railroad he acquired \$9,000.000 worth of construction bonds, and that later he took \$27,000,00 of the first mortgage bonds. The plaintiffs claim no accounting was made for these bonds.

DEMURRERS OVERRULED.

DEMCRIPERS OVERATIONED. New York, July 15,-Judge Ray in the United States circuit court overruled the demutrers interposed to the com-plaint of the sult of the United States "Tobacco company, against the Ameri-can Tobacco company, M. C. Andrews and Forbes company, J. S. Young com-pany, Jamese B. Duke, Earl Jungbluth and Howard B. Young. The action was brought for treble damages under the Sherman anti-trust act of July 2, 1890, as against unlawful restraints of trade and monopolies.

and monopolies. The United States Tobacco company alleges that the defendants conspired to monopolize the manufacture and out-put of licorice paste and does monopo-lize such output.

Judge Ray says: "I am of the opinion that the com-plaint states a cause of action and that the demurrers should be overruled with costs.
