UTAH TO GET CALIFORNIA STOCK.

Two companies of naval militia have been organized at Astoria, Ore.

A group of cavalry for the use of the government is being organized in Nevada. It will be composed of cowboys from the Mason and Carson valleys and will be well mounted and armed.

A woman jury tried a woman's case at Weiser, Idaho, Monday, the defendant being Mrs. George L. Smith, who was charged with a battery upon Mrs. A. Smith. A verdict of acquittal was returned.

C. L. Webster, now in custody at Paris, Mont., will probably be returned to Logan, Utah, where he is wanted for extraditing people in his capacity of portland agent. Sheriff Turner of Logan is now up there.

There are nearly 1,000,000 acres of land in Monterey county, Cal., and open to entry by homesteaders, according to the last report of the United States land office. Much of this is good arable land, though but little is level enough for farming. Nearly all of it is as yet unsecured.

A dispatch from San Francisco says: The schooner James A. Garfield, Capt. Frank, and a half dozen other boats, were coming in late Tuesday night with a heavy tide under a light wind. The schooner died away and the Garfield drifted down on the British bark to the westward, and was struck by the latter, damaging both vessels. Portions of the rigging and one of the bark's bows were carried away.

The stock and sheepmen who are anxious to get their starting cattle and sheep out of Central and Southern California as soon as possible, are being helped by the secretary of agriculture office for the delay in inspecting the inspectors at Sacramento, inspection and present to proceed with the inspection of the animals and authorize their shipment to Utah, Nebraska, Kansas, Iowa and Wyoming.

There are now in Central and Southern California, the stockmen say, 30,000 head of cattle and 100,000 head of sheep that must be moved immediately to good pasturage to prevent their starvation. Most of the stockmen are agreed that nearly all of the cattle and sheep mentioned must be sent out within the next two months.

After making every effort to conceal his identity, N. B. Hagler of St. Paul, Minn., who has been spending the winter in California for his health, made a successful attempt upon the life of the governor in the "Cotton Hotel" in Oakland, before taking the poison that ended his existence he had endeavored to remove from his person and effects every mark and distinctive article that might serve to the world his true name, and for several hours the Oakland authorities were baffled in their efforts to establish his identity. A note left by his bed-side contained the suggestion that the name written on the hotel register was designed to deceive, and expressed the hope that he might die unknown. Signing himself N. C. Hagler the outside left this note: "After a fruitless chase of a year and a half

after health which is constantly failing, my funds are exhausted, and I take the only course left in and out of an existence which is only a burden, without hope for the future. I shall take the same course as you have taken, and by putting them then they will probably see that I am properly started on my journey to that better world where I shall be free from all pain and suffering, where the face in plain but wholesome manner shows which I am traveling, do not want my friends to know that I have come to such an end, so I do not specify to what lodge I belong, but rely on my friends to take a further word. My name is assumed, and I am unknown at Denver. I much regret the trouble I am causing.

Why Miss Willard Gave Up Her Work as a Educator.

In 1871 Miss Willard was made dean of the Woman's college of Northwestern University and professor of aesthetics in the university. In the Woman's college she developed her system of self-government, which has been adopted by other educators. It was while she was head of this institution that an incident occurred which gave her to the world as the great leader of the temperance reform movement. Had it not been for her disagreement with her C. H. Fowler, president of Northwestern University, over the question of discipline, Miss Willard might have remained at the head of the Woman's college until the day of her death. Dr. Fowler declared that the faculty of the university proper would be the final court in all matters pertaining to the conduct of the young ladies, rather than the faculty of the Woman's College. This meant the abolishment of Miss Willard's plan of self-government, and in the proposition she could not assent, and hence resigned her position. To Bishop Fowler, therefore, belongs the credit of giving to the world the eminent leader that afterwards developed the greatest concentration of woman ever known to the annals of advanced nineteenth century womanhood. It was after this disagreement that Miss Willard left her chosen profession of teaching to identify herself with the growing Woman's Christian Temperance Union. She was elected corresponding secretary of the national organization, and developed such zeal and ardor for the work that, in 1875, she was honored by being elected national president. An Experience in a Balloon.

I made an ascent in a gigantic balloon, which toward the end of the sixties, had been brought over by a number of well known French aeronauts, Messrs. Yon, Goddard, Mangin, Chévalier, and Tissandier. Mr. Chévalier, the celebrated meteorologist, who in one of his ascents had attained the greatest height (seven miles), took the direction of the curious ship in that occasion. Shortly before a balloon of moderate extent had been brought to England by Mr. Dyer, I was accidentally prevented from accepting the invitation to take part in the ascent. On the next day the balloon exploded through a fire.

When we ascended afterward in the great motive balloon, the volume of which was less than 25,000 cubic feet, and its height 121 feet, during such stormy weather that Mr. Chévalier thought at first the enterprise should be given up on that day, he had rather a strange experience. At a great altitude we were brought about a rapidly and at such suddenly changing and precipitous angles, that one of the passengers near me was almost with an

insane kind of gladness. All at once he felt an irresistible impulse in three distinct upward into the sun of the air. He was pulled down by three short lines, which he saw side ways on his knees, his eyes being then shut in as he looked.

There were no sails in the air. We stood like an empty bottle in the narrow, dark, and stormy time, which only reached to the lower part of our breast, and which was followed out in the middle, so that the ever-shifting landscape could be seen through it, rather a trying aspect for those given to sea-sickness. The altitude reached was such that the manifest clouds below gradually merged into a mist of the spheres, and then into absolute stillness. The better movements of the balloon, which had been so long out, the bottom part of the voyage was the coming down. It was effected in short but violent rushes, and one fell over and shook as if the boat were thrust into the storm. For all that, I greatly enjoyed the trip.
