Brother Whitcomb confided with TRAVELING MATTHEW for six weeks in capacity of a steward, confiding all the details of the mission to him. He then returned to relatives in Nauvoo, making arrangements for the removal of his wife and children to the West in the spring of 1845. He returned, however, during the summer to a business trip to the East, and in January, 1846, he took an active part in battle at Nauvoo, which occurred on the 27th of January.
