

for the possession of Nelson monument in Trafalgar square. About 10,000 men had assembled in the square to make a demonstration against the government's budget proposal to increase the duty on spirits and beer. The crowd was very unruly, a large proportion of it consisting of an element in search of sport. The police found themselves unable to maintain order, and the pressure on the speakers and resolution readers compelled them to mount the pedestal of the Nelson monument. When, from this eminence the speeches were resumed, they were rendered inaudible to the audience addressed by the uproar among the rioters. The police intervened to secure silence for the orators, and then a great struggle ensued between the mob and police for possession of the monument. The row lasted nearly an hour, and the promoters of the meeting and the police were forced to retire, leaving the crowd singing in triumph, "Rule Britannia." Soon after the mob had compelled the speakers to leave, it surged down to the front of the National Club, which faces Trafalgar Square. Every person noticed entering or leaving the club building was mobbed. The attitude of the crowd was so menacing that the club doors were closed and a messenger dispatched to Scotland Yard for additional police.

At 9 o'clock the rioters were still in full possession of Trafalgar Square, and Northumberland Avenue was also occupied by a mob of many thousands. The police, by this time, had been largely reinforced, had charged a number of times upon the mob and had made several arrests.

LONDON, 14.—A dispatch from Tirpuz to the *Daily Telegraph* says that the people of Afghanistan expect that England will avenge the defeat of the Afghans by the Russians, or endemnify the Ameer for his losses. The dispatch also says Yulani Sarik is head man, and represents Russian rule in Penjdeh. Granville is communicating with Russia in regard to keeping order on the new Russo-Afghan frontier. It is reported that De Giers has asked whether England will accept responsibility for the acts of frontier tribes nominally under control of the Ameer. It is the intention of De Giers to leave Russia free to extend her frontier to the first excuse of tribal discords. The *Standard* says: It is rumored that the Russian reply raises a difficulty in regard to the basis of delimitation. It is expected that a commission of officers will be appointed to examine the northwest frontier of India, with a view to taking into consideration measures of defense. Afghan merchants residing at Merv have petitioned Russia to allow an Afghan agency there.

Vienna, 14.—A dispatch from St. Petersburg to *Political Correspondence* says: The basis of the Anglo-Russian agreement, appears to consist in the abolition of the neutral zone in favor of a direct boundary between Russia and Afghanistan. Russian government circles think this will secure a lasting peace, the neutral zone having been a constant cause of discussion.

LONDON, 14.—Negotiations are proceeding with Turkey for the latter's occupation of Suakim and the Sudan on the following basis: The Porte engages to assist in suppressing the slave trade and in developing external commercial relations beside the formal proposals made through Fehmi Pasha. The Porte accepts an English Company will obtain the option of securing a concession to construct the railway to Berber and will receive other trading rights. Granville is also negotiating with the Italian government concerning an alternative scheme for the occupation of the Red Sea littoral in the event of failure to come to an agreement with the Porte. The *Reform* and *Rossegna* of Rome and other liberal Italian papers are opposed to Italian occupancy of Egypt unless England promises armed support in the event of Italy being involved in a European quarrel. The Italian military journal *Esercito* approves the occupation of Egypt by Italy.

HONG KONG, 14.—The Russian minister at Peking is much concerned over the English occupation of Quelpaert. Vladivostok is closed to foreign vessels unless brought in by a Russian pilot.

TEHERAN, 14.—Col. Alikhanoff, who commanded the Russians in their attack on Penjdeh remains at Merv with 1,000 troops. The Russians have two battalions of infantry and 800 cavalry with two batteries at Sarakhs. They have strong outposts at Puli-Khatum and Zulikar.

SIMLA, India, 14.—The new Afghan frontier line starts at a point near Zulikar, and runs thence eastward to Chamara Chid, from the latter place, the line extends northward down the Kuskh River to Gauzi Khan, and proceeds thence eastward and south to Pehjeh, and to Katoja Sahl.

London, 14.—Negotiations which have been resumed in London between Russia and England respecting the Afghan question are making satisfactory progress. Some further explanations are still required.

THE SLEEP OF THE AGED DISTURBED BY JUDGE ZANE'S RULINGS.

SALT LAKE CITY,  
May 5, 1885.

Editor Deseret News:

In spite of all my efforts to dam up the current of deep sympathy which

has been coursing in my whole system ever since I have witnessed the determined and venal conduct of our enemies, alas! it must and did break out.

I was present on Sunday night in the Tabernacle and listened in torture to the recitals of wrongs suffered by the Saints from the lips of Brother Angus M. Cannon, and reached my home very much prostrated, burdened with my overthrusts and ten years and my sympathetic feelings, and since then have been deeply exercised in body and mind; but the outbreak came in at one o'clock this morning, continuing for nearly four hours, as I lay tossing on my weary couch, with the scalding tears forcing themselves between my eyelids. If a short-hand writer had been present, my outspoken thoughts would have filled the ample pages of your paper; but as I was not so favored, it has occurred to me that it should not be lost to view.

passed by me like this: I fancied that I could see the whole of the Saints in their meetings, the same as at the mass meeting on last Saturday, expressing their sympathy for Brother Cannon and the other victims and fugitives, and mingling their tears and lamentations and uniting in their fastings and prayers to the Great Ruler of the universe. After their meetings were over then came an assembly in the street where Brother Cannon resides, in carriages, on horseback and on foot; a procession formed, and at the head of it a white hearse containing the fair form of Liberty enclosed. A procession formed in the carriages, on horses and on foot of all present, and then I thought they marched in slow time, with bands of music playing the "Dead March," and when they arrived at a spot near the Penitentiary a halt was called, and the casket consigned to an open grave, with all the solemn rites of funeral sepulture.

Then came the scene of parting with our beloved President, and then the harrowing thought of what would meet him in that loathsome abode of criminals. When I thought of that abode of misery my heart grew sick, and floods of scalding tears partially relieved my agonized feelings. But what a thought of dread came over me; what feelings of sympathy for him who has during his long, active and pure life, a life of usefulness, surrounded with all the comforts of a refined and happy home to be thus outraged, annoyed and insulted. Next came the sickening thought of his being cooped up in the narrow, filthy bunk, the unventilated dormitory, with all the accompanying nausea of such a condition, I exclaimed in the agony of my soul.

"HOW LONG, O LORD SHALL THESE THINGS CONTINUE? MAKE BARE THINE ARM."

I now feel calm and resigned, and can say, "O Lord Thy will be done." At one time my feelings of indignation were of the most intense description; but the comforting words came to my relief that, "Vengeance is Mine; I will repay saith the Lord."

### MINUTES OF DAVIS COUNTY MASS MEETING.

Pursuant to the call made by the committee appointed at Logan to draft a series of resolutions and protest to the President and people of the United States, in which the wrongs of the people of this Territory were to be set forth, the people of the Davis Stake of Zion assembled en masse at Farmington, on Saturday, May 2nd, at 1 p. m., and after listening a short time to music by the Kaysville martial band were called to order by Bishop J. M. Secrist, of Farmington, who nominated Mr. Thomas F. Roueche, of Kaysville, for chairman. Mr. Roueche was unanimously elected. He thanked the assembly for the honor conferred, and asked for the election of a secretary and such other officers as might be deemed necessary. The following were then nominated and unanimously elected to the several offices, respectively:

Joseph Barton, secretary; David Stoker, vice-president; John W. Whitaker and James H. Wilcox, assistant secretaries; Calvin W. Richards, sergeant-at-arms; Geo. Palmer, doorkeeper.

After the organization was completed, Mrs. Dora Robinson, assisted by Mr. Joseph E. Robinson, sang "The Star Spangled Banner," with chorus by the Farmington choir.

The chaplain offered up a prayer, and was followed with music by the Kaysville martial band.

The chairman, in plain, concise language, then stated the object of the meeting, and called for the reading of the Declaration of Grievances and Protest, prepared by the committee. This was done very ably, in a clear and impressive style by Assistant Secretary J. H. Wilcox. During the reading and at the close, the applause was frequent and hearty.

At the close of the reading, Mrs. E. Brown sang "Land of Washington," assisted in the chorus by the Farmington choir.

Mr. Thomas J. Steed, of Farmington, moved "that it is the sense of this meeting that we adopt the Declaration of Grievances and Protest as read, and earnestly endorse the sentiments therein contained," and followed with

a short, pointed and telling speech in support of his motion.

Speeches were made by Mr. John R. Barnes, of Kaysville, Job Welling, of Farmington, and Joseph Barton, of Kaysville, depicting in a graphic manner the wrongs suffered by the members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints since the organization of the Church to the present time; the mobbings and drivings in Missouri and other places; the call made for the "Mormon Battalion;" the misrepresentations of Federal officials to the General Government in regard to the "Mormons;" the animosity shown to "Mormons" by officials sent to Utah; the perversion of laws, and partiality in their administration; the high-handed acts of the Utah Commission in arbitrarily and without authority prohibiting the exercise of the elective franchise by members of the Church who were violating no law, but were industrious, virtuous and law-abiding citizens of the United States; and who, while so arbitrarily and unjustly keeping this class of citizens from the polls, as carefully guarded and protected the elective franchise of the most depraved and lewd of the non-"Mormon" part of the population. It was also pointed out that the actions of the Federal Judges who are sent here ostensibly to administer the laws impartially, show that they forget the high and important position they occupy for whenever a "Mormon" is on trial they become vindictive and spiteful, ignoring the written law, and making a law to suit the case in hand—anything to insure a conviction, the end justifying the means. This was illustrated by the words of one of the Federal Judges, who proclaimed: "The mission which God has called upon me to perform in Utah is as much above the duties of other courts and Judges as the heavens are above the earth, and whenever or wherever I may find the local or Federal laws obstructing or interfering, I shall trample them under my feet."

The acts of the Governors of the Territory have not been such as would draw the people towards them, but otherwise.

Allusion was also made to "the one man power" vested in the Governor which has been used to the injury of the Territory, socially and financially, as shown when bills passed by the Legislature for the welfare and prosperity of the Territory have been vetoed—notably among others, appropriations for educational purposes to the University of Deseret, and a bill for the registration of voters and election of officers; also by his efforts to nullify existing laws by arbitrarily appointing to office men who were not the people's choice.

The right of the people to petition for redress and to earnestly protest against the continuance of these abuses were maintained. The speakers were frequently interrupted by applause, and when the vote on the question was called, it showed that all present were of one mind, for the vote was hearty and unanimous.

The Farmington Choir sang an anthem, a vote of thanks was tendered the officers, speakers, singers and the martial band, benediction was pronounced by the Chaplain and the meeting adjourned sine die.

The Secretary was instructed to forward a copy of these minutes to the *Deseret News* and *Salt Lake Herald*.

### DROWNED IN SNAKE RIVER.

MANAN, BINGHAM CO., Idaho,

Editor Deseret News:

A most deplorable accident occurred here on Saturday, the 2nd inst., while two of Brother J. R. Pool's sons were crossing the old river bed of the South Fork of Snake River. The father sent Milburn A. a boy of 14 years of age, to the store, and he consented to let Herbert, a five year old son of Harriet Bliton Pool, go with him. They got across to the Louisville side of the river all right, but when coming back they missed the ford by driving too low down. The buggy was instantly capsized and the two boys were thrown into the turbid stream. The younger of the two boys almost instantly disappeared in the rushing torrent. The elder, by remarkable presence of mind, held to the lines and the horses pulled him ashore. The deceased was born Oct. 25th, 1880, in this place, and was the second Latter-day Saint child born here. He was a remarkably

smart child, and a favorite with all. Brother and Sister Pool are almost frantic with grief. They have the sympathy of the entire people, who are doing all they can to find the body, but it is not known that a body drowned in Snake river in this part has ever been found.

On the same day Mr. R. Wright, while crossing the same river, had two fine horses drowned, and lost his entire load of flour, bacon, etc.

The waters are rising rapidly, and it is extremely dangerous crossing the river at any of the fords. The farmers have sown nearly twice the amount of grain they did last. The prospects are excellent for a bountiful harvest.
