ROBERT RAY HAMILTON.

Said to Have Been Drowned in Yellowstone Park.

HELENA, Mont., Sept. 14.—Word has been received that Robert Roy Hamilton of New York, whose name is widely known in newspaper circles in connection with the case of a wife last year for a railing affair with her maid, has been drowned in Yellowstone Park. The news was brought by J. O. Green, son of Dr. Norris Green of the Western Union Telegraph Company, who has been in the park about two months ago in the park and has been there since. When Green and party arrived at the park on August 22nd, they found that Hamilton had been absent on a hunting trip several days. The next day they started out to search for him and found his body thirty miles from the much in Snake River, while his horse and hunting dog were a short distance away.

GREEN SAYS THAT HE POSITIVELY IDENTIFIED HAMILTON'S BODY, THAT HE WAS SEEN IN THE PARK SINCE AND HE IS SURPRISED THAT THE NEWS HAS NOT GOTTEN OUT BEFORE.

GREEN THINKS THE UNFORTUNATE MAN WAS ACCIDENTALLY DROWNED WHILE TRYING TO FEED HIS HORSE. THE HORSE FELL INTO THE RIVER AND HAMILTON WAS ON THE SADDLE ON IT WHEN IT TURNED DOWN THE RIVER.

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—No positive confirmation of the story of Robert Roy Hamilton's death could be obtained from Hamilton's relatives in this city. His father, Gen. Schuyler Hamilton, said he had heard from his son that he was in the park, but had himself received no information about it. He expects news in the morning.
