8 ASSAULTED AND CHOKED TO DEATH.

Mrs. John Kirkpatrick of Allegheney, Pa., Murdered as She Was On Her Way Home

SUSPECT IS UNDER ARREST.

Man Had Been an Admirer of the Woman for Several Years-Blood Stain on Overcoat.

Pittsburg, Feb, 5 .- The dead body of Mrs. John Kirkpatrick was found today in the back yard of an unoccupied house at No. 9 Jackson street, Alles heny, only a short distance from her home. She had been murdered and the morgue physician tonight stated that the woman had been criminally assaulted.

For the past several months Mrs. Kirkpatrick has been living at the restdence of Mrs. Jessie Scott on Jackson street, with her husband and 18months-old babe.

Last night she took her baby to her mother's home on Isabella street so she could attend to the marketing. Her hus-hand was to meet her at the Isabella street house at 10 o'clock, but when he failed to keep the appointment sha started for her home with her pur chases, intending to return for the

After leaving the streetcar near her home she was seen talking to a tall man wearing a high hat and long overcoat. A few moments later she was evidently dragged into Creighton alley where she was heard to exclaim: "Oh WRI

where she was heard to exclaim: "Oh, don't: I'll do anything you say." When the body was discovered today at 1 o'clock it was found that the wo-man had been choked to death and traces in the snow showed that she had been dragged 13 feet along the alley to the yard gate and thrown inskle. A family at 13 Jackson street heard the souffling and quarreling in the alley, but, being newcomers in the neighbor-hood, decided not to interfere in any hood, decided not to interfere in any

way. Mrs. Kirkpatrick's assailant is supposed to be some man who was at least an acquaintance of hers, because during the evening a man answering the description of the man seen talking to her called twice at the Scott house and asked for Mattie (the woman's first name) and appeared to be an old friend.

Late fonight the police arrested Nor-man Geyer, a boardmaker in a local broker office, and are holding him on the charge of murder, Developments show that Geyer had been an admirer of Mrs. Kirkpatrick for several years before her marriage and for a time was the cause of an attraneous the before her marriage and for a time was the cause of an estrangement be-tween Kirkpatrick and his wife. The trouble had been smoothed over and the couple ware living happily together, but last week Mrs. Kirkpatrick, it is said, complained to her husband that Gever was annoying her by following her on the stread and nersisting in her on the streets and persisting in

her on the streets and persisting in talking to her. When arrested tonight a bloodstain was found on Geyer's overcoat sleeve, and the knuckles of his right hand were cut, the abrasions being such, the physicians say, as could be made by the sharp edges of human teeth. As it was found that several of the murdered woman's teeth had been knocked out, the police believe they have captured the right man. The body of the murdered, woman was identified tonight as that of Mrs. Louise Schroeder, whose husband lives in Astoria, Long Island.

ASSEMBLY OF NOBLES VOTES ADDRESS TO CZAR

Moscow, Feb. 4.-The assembly of nobles today voted on two addresses to the emperor, and the conservative address was adopted by a vote of 219 to 14%. After a lengthy discussion, however, the assembly decided to for-ward both the liberal and the conserva-tive addresses to his majesty.

A dispatch from Moscow last Wednesday said that two drafts of resolu-tions were in circulation, one insisting only on the maintenance of the autocracy and the other asking political freedom for Russia, urging the gov-ernment to make necessary changes in the law to enable a representative as-sembly to be convoked, and appealing to the throne to issue a manifesto assuring the country of its intention to take steps to this end-without which it would be impossible to restore tranquility to the country.
