TIGHT AGAINST BAMBERGER ROAD

Apparently a Continuance of the Opposition of the Harri-man Interests.

FUNERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS.

Democrats Hold Primaries—Union and Depot Company—Glenwood Racing Season Opens Thursday Night.

Ogden, June 3.—That the fight against Simon Bamberger's interurban road into Ogden is nothing more than the continuance of the Harri-man fight against the road, is being shown more each day by the persistent fight that is being carried on against the road. When the city council said that Senator Bamberger could not use steam temporarily in his entrance to Ogden, he went to work to have the track fixed up preparatory to the electrifying of the same from Twenty-fifth street to Thirty-first street, on Lincoln avenue. A protest was sent to the council some time ago by the residents on Lincoln avenue, who asked for the removal of the rails which had been laid by Bamberger, while at the same time, the information was given out that as soon as Bamberger abandoned the track from Twenty-fifth to Thirty-first street on Lincoln avenue the Ogden Rapid Transit company would be ready to lay a track on the same street. But nothing of this sort was done, and Mr. Bamberger's men have been engaged during the past two weeks in getting the track in shape preparatory for electrification.

What will eventually be done in this matter is awaited with interest by the public. It is very probable that something will be done within the next few days, when Senator

Bamberger will visit Ogden. A temporary depot terminal is being erected at Thirty-first street and Lincoln avenue by the road, and this will be used for the present, and an auto-bus line will be opened from the terminal to the heart of the city and up to the Bamberger resort in Ogden canyon. The auto line will be operated during the summer whenever there is an excursion to the Lagoon.

RESTRAINING ORDER ISSUED.
A restraining order was issued in the district court yesterday afternoon by Judge Howell in the matter of the petition of the Utah Billposting company vs. W. B. and May Sawyer, agents of the company, to prevent their destroying any property of the company and accounting for all monies collected. The order was made returnable June 14, with a bond of \$500.

Brigham Young University at Provo Closes Another Successful Year.

Provo, Utah Co., June 3.—The commencement exercises of the Brigham Young university were held yesterday in the Provo tabernacle. The students marched from the university, arriving at about 10 o'clock.
