LAST NIGHT'S DISPATCHES.

EASTERN.

WASHINGTON, 23.—A telegram has been received from the special commission at Vienna, appointed by the President to examine into alleged irregularities in the case of the suspended commissioners.

PORTLAND, Me. 23.—A dispatch from Presque Isle today, says that a heavy deposit of snow, of about four feet, fell on the city of Portland, today, and that the snow was very much drifted.

INDIANAPOLIS.—The State Editor, John W. Watson, of the Louisville Courier-Journal, today, from St. Louis, was burned near McAllister, in the Indian nation, this morn.

RASTON.—Jas. Collins, who murdered Deputy Sheriff Hayden and Thomas Hubbard, in a lumber camp on Wednesday night, was captured in the cellar of his house in Mapleton, and was soon after hanged by the party from Presque Isle.

LOUISVILLE.—About 11 o'clock today, a heavy wind storm passed over this city, accompanied with an immense amount of hail, which covered the ground to the depth of several inches; fortunately no serious damage was done.

WEST INDIES.

HAVANA, April 23.—It is feared that in case of a further decline in sugar abroad and on the exchange here, many prominent foreign and domestic houses will be compelled to suspend.

The commander of the English gunboat *Power*, after consultation with the British Consul at Santiago de Cuba, sailed for Manzanillo, and arrived there today.

The commander politely asked the authorities to deliver him to him, promising to convey him to the United States, and that he should not return to Cuba.

CHICAGO, 1.—There was a fire this morning at Nos. 63, 65 and 67 West Washington street, which destroyed Wilson Brothers' shoe factory, J. Smith's wholesale notions and shoe store, and the Co. & Co.'s shoe warehouse; loss, in aggregate, \$100,000; insurance about \$200,000.

A Washington special says that a dispatch received at the War Department today, gives a full confirmation of the press reports regarding the latest and most terrible features of the campaign against the Medes, and that the army received Secretary Robeson called upon General Sherman to call an advanced conference.
