LAST NIGHT'S DISPATCHES.

EASTERN.—A telegram
has been received from the special
commissioned at Vicksburg, who stated
that the rebels are attacking the
Union fortifications of the original
commission, to the effect that some of
the suspended commissioners appear
to be in command of the forces of
the rebels, receiving money.

It leaves the following persons free
from the charge of any irregularity:

Doctor Anthony Rappone, Thomas
McElrath, Lewis Sengsoung, S. J. Battin, G. J. Bell, H. H.
Garrison, John Galt, George C. James
and Wm. F. Rounds.

They are recommended as part of the
suspended commissioners, and are
not to be held responsible for any
irregularities.

A committee of fifteen citizens
are co-operating with them. A
federal service will be had at St. Paul's church in this city.

WASHINGTON.—The Supreme
Court of the United States, to-day,
postponed until October, the application
of the counsel of ex-governor
Warmoth, for the allowance of an
appeal from the decision of Justice
John B. Thompson in the Louisiana
case, and leave to Phillips, his
counsel for Warmoth, to file the record and other papers in the case. The court adjourned sine die.

PORTLAND.—A dispatch
from Portland, to-day, says that
G. A. Hayden, deputy sheriff of
Brookwood Co., and Thomas Hib-
bard were murdered in their camp
three miles from that place last
night by James Collins, who entered
the camp and killed them
with an axe by the camp fire.

There were four men in camp, two
of whom were killed, and one
survived. The country is alive with
parties seeking to arrest the mur-
derer.

PHILADELPHIA.—A partial truce
for hours took place to-day, in var-
ious cities; there was no act of
violence.

NASHVILLE.—The third annual
exposition opened with a splendid
display from various States.

INDIANAPOLIS.—The late Edi-
torial observations were addressed by
Henry Watterson of the Louis-
ville Courier Journal.

DENISON, TEXAS.—A large mail
from St. Louis was turned over
to Mr. Foster, in the Indian nation,
this morning.

BANGOR.—Jos. Collins, who mur-
dered Deputy Sheriff Hayden and
Thomas Hubbard, in his home
on Wednesday, was found
dead in the cellar of his house
in Mapleton, and was soon after
handed by the party from Presque
Isle.

LOUISVILLE.—About 11 o'clock
to-day, a very wild storm passed
over this city, accompanied with
an immense amount of hail, which
covered the ground to the depth of
several inches; fortunately no seri-
ous damage was done.

WEST INDIES.

HAVANA, APRIL 28.—It is feared
that in case of a further decline in
sugar abroad and on the exchange
here, many prominent foreign and
domestic houses will be compelled
to suspend.

The commander of the English
gunboat "Plover," after consultation
with the British Consul at Santiago
de Cuba, sailed for Manzanillo and
arrived there to-day. The
commander delivered to him
promises to convey him
and his gunboat to the nearest
military station, and that he
should not return to Cuba. The
Manzanillo authorities consulted
Captain General Peltain by tel-
egraph, who answered that it was
impossible to grant the com-
mander's request, that he was powerless
before the laws of the country,
and that the trial must proceed
according to law.

CHICAGO.—There was a fire
in Louis' Printery, while a compo-
nent was last night, from an at-
tack of puerperal fever, arose from
her bed, and taking with her an
infant nine days old, leapt into a
cistern under her bed, and was
drowned. Her husband died four
days ago, and missing his wife,
made a search with the result
stated.

New York, I.—A Vice-Special
states that the Prince of Wales and
a distinguished company yesterday
visited the Exposition building.

Seven thousand drays, laden with
articles for the Exposition, are be-
tween the frontiers and Vienna,
and only about a dozen can be un-
loaded daily. It will be the end of June
before the show is in full progress.

The Indian Commissioners in ses-
sion here discredit the Toronto
story of Americans being held
in the Blackfeet country, and had a
distracted view of the military
station nearest the Blackfeet
country, and no mention was made
of disturbances.

CHICAGO.—There was a fire
in the morning at Nos. 83, 85 and 67
West Washington Street, which
destroyed Wilson Brothers' shirt
factory. P. Smith's wholesale
merchandise, and Stone, Fairbanks, Morse
& Co.'s scale warehouse. Loss
in aggregate, \$100,000, insurance amount
stated.

A Washington special says that
official dispatches received from
the War Department to-day, give a full
confirmation of the reports con-
cerning the most terrible
scenery of the campaign against
the Modocs. As soon as they were
received Secretary Robinson called
upon General Sherman and a
representative of the War Department
and the trial must proceed
according to law.

NOVA SCOTIA.

HALIFAX.—The steamer "Lakota"
was arrived to-day from the port of
the Atlantic. This week has
been almost known for pieces with
large and large quantities of
goods recovered. Yesterday four
dead bodies were brought up, one
of whom was twenty-one years old.
Those recorded were mostly women.
They were frightfully mutilated
and were immediately buried. The
total number of bodies thus far
recovered is three hundred and
forty-nine.

This astonishment is expressed
here because of the paucity of
the work on the new cable. The
suspension is said to be a conse-
quence of the recent sea disturbance
by the cable companies.
