FRANK BELEVILL WILL CONFESS TO MURDER.

A Tumbler Vendor Truly Mysterious—Finds Fortifications—To Investigate—Warden's Inquiry.

On complaint of Charlotte Yates of Paris, Ind., Vernon Hunt has been arrested at that place charged with criminal assault.
