County Clerk Fees—County Clerk Edwards reports the fees of his office for the month of February as \$2,092.08, which is an increase over the month of January of \$109.28.

Irvine Goes to U. S. N. Yorktown—Ensign Ed Irvine, U. S. N., who has been home for several months on sick leave, has been ordered to the warship Yorktown now on the west coast.

In Memoriam—The Salvation Army held special services last evening, in memory of the 10 army officials who were drowned on the Long Island steam steamer "Hesperus" which was wrecked off Block Island.

Party Soldiers Turn Civilians—Forty soldiers were discharged Saturday evening, from the Twenty-ninth Infantry at Fort Douglas. They will go on furloughs of one to three months, after re-enlistment for service in the islands.

B. P. O. E. Minstrel Show—The Elks minstrel show will be given March 26 and 27, with Harry Shearman, Lester D. Reed and J. S. Critchfield as prominent attractions. There will be 100 women and girls on the stage during the performance.

Robbed in Y. M. C. A.—Boys from the Riverside and Utah schools report having had their clothing robbed while in the Y. M. C. A. building, on the other day. One of the boys, Harry O'Neill, lost a \$15 watch. Secy. Cox is doing what he can to discover the thieves.

Building for Woodmen—The Woodmen of the World, camp 53, are planning to erect their long proposed building on Market street immediately west of Odd Fellows hall. The structure is to be two stories high, with second floor devoted to lodge purposes, and the ground floor for stores. Several sketches have been submitted by architects.

C. N. Strevell's Solution—Mr. and Mrs. C. N. Strevell have returned from a pleasant trip to California. Mr. Strevell is convinced from noting the operation of the double track system in California, that the only solution of the freight congestion question is the double tracking of the Union Pacific road all the way between Omaha and Salt Lake.

Second Avenue Improvement—Second avenue improvement interested, have agreed to a plan for the reduction of the "hump" at the top of Canyon road hill from a 15 to a 10 per cent grade, so that teams can climb up Canyon road with no more difficulty than in ascending the First avenue hill between State and 10th streets. Up to date, it has been impossible for anything short of a light milk wagon to make the climb, and even that was a new record for the hill. The monthly active reconstruction of the street will begin, the intention being to make it of the most attractive thoroughfares in the west.

SALES IN NEVADA.

Salt Lake Electrical Supply House Goes Out After Business.

Lorenzo Haddock has just returned from a three weeks' trip in the interests of his firm, the Intermountain Electric company of this city. There has been some question in the minds of local merchants as to their ability to compete with San Francisco for the Nevada business, but Mr. Haddock reports the sales of his house of three carloads of electrical supplies at Elko, and states that he met with very favorable consideration at each place he visited on his trip throughout the state. He returns with a number of new orders for business in Nevada all that is necessary is for Salt Lake business men to "go after it."

Mr. Haddock was among those having return tickets over the Salt Lake route and upon arriving at Las Vegas was informed that owing to a washout between that point and Caliente the company had arranged to transfer its passengers to the Southern Pacific by way of Los Angeles. Mr. Haddock spent several days in the City of the Angels. He reports that city as being on the high tide of a boom, with train loads of people arriving daily. Business men there have a very friendly feeling for Salt Lake, especially do they appreciate the solidity of its growth as evidenced by the cities, and industries. Its attraction to tourists, as well as its large agricultural resources. Salt Lake manufacturers are beginning to place their goods such as the Los Angeles market. Noticeable among these were the chocolates which McDonald is now feeding the people of lower California, having opened a house on Lower Broadway street, there with Chas Pike as manager, and J. R. Squires, another Salt Lake boy, as solicitor, and their work is being done by the local candy men with alarm.

One thing which Mr. Haddock considers as one of the foremost factors in the phenomenal growth of the city is the clusters of electric lights placed on ornamental iron standards along the main street here are now agitating a movement of this kind, as they realize that Salt Lake's principal thoroughfare is being lighted up as some of the side streets of other cities.

Mr. Haddock feels, however, that Salt Lake's present promise of the glorious future and returns more than ever satisfied with his home in the City of the Saints.

Among the big business deals of the week Mr. C. B. Hawley, manager of the Intermountain Electric company, reports closing a contract with the Boston Copper and Brass Co. for \$12,500 worth of electrical supplies to be used in its new smelter at Garfield.
