Third—As the horses are hitched to a long double tree directly in front of the machine, they walk just side of the cut, (no grass is cut behind them, the space between them only being the grass tangled forward by one horse is cut clean on the return cut on the same side of the field, leaving the cut hay together more convenient to draw in. Fourth—As the horses north the machine go on the grass after it is cut it is left lighter and will from one-fourth to one-third quicker and more evenly than when cut with other machines.
