London, 6.-There have been several heavy robberies of arms, ammunition, the past few days: At Belfast a large quantity of arms was stolen last evening; five persons were arrested this morning on suspicion. He referred, with satisfaction to the favorable settlement of the difficulties with Greece and the pacification of Crete, and the friend-ly relations of Turkey with all foreign powers. He said he should continue to insist on economy in the Administration, improvement in judicial proced-ure, the extension of the railroad sys-tem, and the equal participation by all classes of his subjects in the obligations and benefits of these reforms.
