particularly on lucern. Those people that have but small numbers of fowls can join together and join together and incubator for several purchase an families. Bell a dozen eggs, you get 15 to 20 cts. Produce a spring chicken, you get from 25 to 40 cts. Then if you do not want to sell them all, you can have once in a while one to eat. Those that have small flocks of poultry and large families of children will do well to let the children raise the poultry on shares. It induces children to be come self-supporting, and makes your table better, and your pockets fatter.
