# POSTOFFICE SUB-STATIONS.

Six New Ones to be Established in Salt Lake.

A telegram has been received by Senator Kearns from the postmaster general at Washington announcing that Salt Lake will be allowed six additional postoffice sub-stations, effective July 1st. The sub-Stations will be located an

some distance from the postoffice, so that the postoffice facilities may be by the greatest number possible. At the sub-stations all business can be transacted that is done at the main post-office, but no mail is delivered or reof the full board: ceived through it. Each sub-station is run by one agent who draws a salary of \$100 the first year, after which his compensation is increased in proportion to the business done. The maximum

salary paid is \$900 a year. Postmaster Thomas will make the appointments of agents and recommend locations for the new sub-stations. Postmaster S. W. Ross of Lehi saw Senator Kearns yesterday relative to the securing of sub-station for that town. As the Lehi postoflice is a third class office it is not entitled to a sub-station. However, Senator Kearns suggested that there might be a rural free delivery secured for Lehi and that he would use his influence to secure such a service.
