PUMPING PLANT

Despite the Storm Those Who Went Were Much Pleased.

ONE PUMP WAS OPERATED.

It Threw Out a Stream Equalling 66," 000,000 Gallons Every 24 Hours -Several Schemes Discussed.

Despite the efforts of the weather man to upset the plans of the visitors from Salt Lake, those who went down to the pumping plant yesterday returned more than pleased with what was presented to their gaze when they got there. Although the inspection proper was materially interfered with, there was a good deal to be seen and quite as much to be learned, and all took advantage of the opportunity afforded.

As stated in last night's "News" the gale was such that the pumps had to be closed down. But between 1 and 2 be closed down. But between 1 and 2 o'clock one was started up so that the visitors got an excellent idea of the possibilities of the immense project. This pump produced a stream of 100 second feet, which in plain English is equivalent to 66,000,000 gallons every 24 hours, or over five times the amount of water consumed by Salt Lake City in the time indicated. With all the pumps in operation as idea may be had of the in operation an idea may be had of the volume of water taken out of the lake.

During the day the visitors discussed the feasibility of several contemplated schemes, one of which was an exchange of the water for that in Big Cottonwood for city use. The diking of the lake was also talked of in order that the water might be kept from receding from the pumps, especially on such a day as that experienced by the visitors yesterday. It was thought, too, that instead of dredging the lake a series of piles might be driven, say 1,200 feet from the intake in such a way as to prevent the sand from accumulating near the pumps. This piling would be started pumps. This pilling would be started 400 feet from the pumps and in this way there would be no danger whatever from the latter being in any way inter-
