

WHOLE CRIMEA ON VERGE OF REVOLT

Anarchy Reigns in the Mountains
Of the Caucasus From Ba-
toun to Baku

WORKMEN BACKING MUTINEERS

Crews of Several Ships Join Them—
Kniaz Potemkin's Guns Trained
On Theodosia.

St. Petersburg, July 6, 7:45 p. m.—The Black sea fleet has gone to Theodosia, according to advices received by the admiralty late this afternoon. Admiral Choukine's warships left Sevastopol for Theodosia at about noon today, and should have arrived there early this evening. The result is awaited with the most intense anxiety.

Dispatches received from the governor of Eimferopol, who is executing the decree of martial law at Theodosia, say that about half of the Kniaz Potemkin's crew desire to surrender, but they are prevented from doing so by the revolutionists. There were only six companies of troops at Theodosia yesterday, but reinforcements of infantry and artillery have been dispatched from Sevastopol, and probably reached there today.

It transpires that the torpedo boat which accompanied the Kniaz Potemkin was towed out from Kusteni to Theodosia, and was not sunk, as was supposed.

An official report from Gen. Kabanoff, the military commander of Theodosia, declares that there has been the wildest exaggeration regarding the number of casualties resulting from the rioting at Odessa. He gives the following figures: Of the mob 49 were killed and 74 wounded; of the police and troops one man was killed and 20 wounded.

Such news as came from the Black sea and Caucasus during the day was extremely alarming. The revolutionists in the peninsula are on the verge of revolt and anarchy reigns in the mountains of the Caucasus from Batoun to Baku.

At Theodosia the workmen are backing the mutineers. The crews of several ships in the harbor have joined the mutineers and the well-to-do class of the population has fled in panic. The guns of the Kniaz Potemkin are trained on the city and a bombardment is momentarily expected.

Only six hours away, on the other side of the peninsula, Admiral Choukine's fleet, which included six warships, not counting Rear Admiral Kruger's squadron, lies at anchor under the menace of the guns of the fortress. Choukine evidently is afraid to test the loyalty of his crews by setting them the task of capturing the mutineers' ship.

According to reports current in St. Petersburg, four torpedo boats, with volunteers on board, have sailed for Theodosia to sink the Kniaz Potemkin, but the reports lack confirmation and must be accepted with reserve.

The Stremitsky, which actually had a volunteer crew on board for that purpose and missed her quarry at Kusteni, left Carna yesterday.

Several boats which Lewis Nixon built are at Sevastopol, and it might be used, Mr. Nixon himself has not been heard from and telegrams dispatched to him remain unanswered. This does not indicate cause for alarm, so far as he personally is concerned, but is probably due to the censorship. However, it tends to confirm the extreme situation.

Telegrams from the Caucasus, where a state bordering on anarchy has existed for a month, say the news of the mutiny on board the Kniaz Potemkin made an electric impression and was the signal for a general movement with which troops on the coast were powerless to cope. Railroad traffic in all directions has ceased and the people are fleeing on horseback and in all kinds of vehicles over the mountain roads and trails.

Almost consternation prevails in official circles here.

A press dispatch from Sebastopol gives a rumor that the Kniaz Potemkin went to Sevastopol late yesterday afternoon. If the squadron arrived before her departure, either the surrender of the battleship or a battle is regarded as certain. Admiral Choukine, it is believed, would not risk the ships in search of the mutinous vessel unless sure that there would be no repetition of the Odessa fiasco.

Rumors of the most diverse nature are in circulation, one of which is that two torpedo boats attacked the Kniaz Potemkin and were sunk by her.

The cruiser Chomouretz, which was at Sebastopol Monday, and for which much anxiety was felt, has arrived at Yalta, on the south coast of the Crimea.

Advices received from Minister of the Interior Boulenger report a serious anti-Semitic agitation in the governments of Ekaterinoslav and Kherson.

According to dispatches from Odessa, the president of the Permanent Peace association has been given notice by the authorities to leave the city within 15 days. The dispatches also say that the insurance companies are refusing to pay the losses by fire in the port during the disturbances.

Gen. Linvitch's telegraphic report to the emperor charging the Japanese with using dum-dum bullets probably will be made the subject of a communication to the powers protesting against the violation of the Geneva convention.

Among the Liberals a story is being industriously circulated and believed that Japan at the Washington peace conference will demand that the treaty of peace, if concluded, shall be submitted for the ratification of the Russian people in order to insure its observance in case of a change of government.

The emperor has offered the position of minister of the interior, to succeed M. Boulenger, to M. Shipoff of Moscow, former president of the zemstvo congress. According to popular rumor, M. Shipoff will accept only on condition that full freedom be accorded to the press and to public meetings.

RUSSIAN PLENIPOTENTIARY.

M. Muraviev Will Receive Czar's Instructions.

St. Petersburg, July 6.—M. Muraviev will arrive Sunday. He will receive special instructions from the emperor and consult with the various ministers, and will leave with his suite for Washington probably about July 20, but the date is not absolutely fixed.

Russia has not yet received information as to Japan's attitude toward an armistice.

The Slavo today severely criticizes the selection of M. Muraviev as one of the Russian plenipotentiaries, declaring that he is neither the ability nor the temperament to conduct great negotiations. His rise to the position of minister of justice, the paper affirms, was not due to his faithfulness to the ideals of justice, but rather devotion to the arbitrary methods which are exalted throughout Russia.

The Slavo recalls "the deplorable incidents which marked M. Muraviev's connection with the Hartmann affair in Paris and The Hague conference," as reasons for expressing the opinion that negotiations under his direction are sure to be accompanied by many disappointments.

It is generally understood here that M. Muraviev's selection was extremely distasteful to Foreign Minister Lansdowne, and it was the emperor's personal act.

Odessa Outbreak Loses.

New York, July 5.—According to the Odessa correspondent of the Novosti, the total losses through the outbreak are estimated at \$2,000,000.

The insurance officers refused the payment of claims, alleging that the riot is responsible.

The newspapers are not allowed to give details of the doings of the Kniaz Potemkin or even of the proclamation issued by the crew guaranteeing the protection of foreign commerce.

American Tourists in Morocco.

New York, July 5.—For the first time since Raisuli's raid on the road from Tangier to Fez two American tourists have undertaken the journey to the Moorish court by the direct overland route, says the Tangier correspondent of the Herald. They are James Roosevelt, a relative of the president and A. C. White, son of the American ambassador to Italy.

They are bearers of letters of introduction to court dignitaries.

MRS. BENDER ARRESTED.

Charged with Perjury in Trying To Secure a Widow's Share.

Chicago, July 7.—Mrs. Matilda Bender and her daughter Marie have been arrested on charges of perjury and conspiracy in connection with their attempt to secure for Charlotte Bender a widow's share in the estate of the late Col. George T. Cline. The estate for which the Benders were fighting is valued at almost \$2,000,000.

The story which was told to Judge Cutting by Mrs. Bender and her daughter some months ago hangs on their contention that Robert Cline, now dead, and the dead millionaire were one and the same person. Mrs. Bender declared that while posing as "Robert Cline, cattle buyer from Texas," he married Charlotte Bender.

During the proceedings before Judge Cutting and later before the grand jury the supposed widow of the millionaire did not appear to testify, her mother and sister saying that she was being confined in an insane asylum.

Judge Cutting refused to recognize the claim of Charlotte Bender, and recommended that the grand jury investigate the case. As the result the mother and sister of the claimant were indicted and the indictments kept secret until their arrest.

San Francisco, July 7.—Custom house inspectors have seized eight raw seal skins valued at about \$100 in the forepeak of the steamer Martara which arrived a few days ago from Alaska with a cargo of sealings. These seal skins were not on the manifest and were evidently designed to be smuggled. They were confiscated and will be sold.

MAY NOT TALK SOCIALISM IN BERLIN

M. Jaures, Eminent French Socialist, So Informed by German Ambassador to France.

WIDELY DISCUSSED IN PRESS.

Liberal Organs Condemn the Interdiction While Conservative Ones Commend It.

Berlin, July 6.—Chancellor von Buelow telegraphed to Prince Radolin, the German ambassador at Paris, today to inform M. Jaures, the French Socialist leader, that the German government thought it best to debar him from speaking in Berlin July 9, as it had been announced he intended to do.

The chancellor's telegram to Prince Radolin was in part as follows:

"The press has announced that M. Jaures will appear before the Socialist meeting here July 9. Against the personal liberty of M. Jaures I have nothing to say. I respect his views on foreign politics and not infrequently agree with him. I am glad that on several occasions he has promoted friendly relations between Germany and France. The personal value of M. Jaures is not considered, but the political role played upon him."

The leading organ of the Socialists in Germany, the Vorwaerts, announces that the assembly plan is the beginning of the immediate influence of the Social Democracy upon the organs of the so-called Scientific Socialism, the New Society, which says: "The revolution has dynamized the Russian-French alliance. Now it becomes the historical task of the German Social Democracy to do for the French republic what the holders of power in Russia are no longer able to do—to protect them from exaggerated claims by the use of the result of impetuous Germany's policy."

"This is the outspoken direction in which the demonstration leads. The German Socialists would use the presence of Herr Jaures to Berlin to cover by his person their hostile endeavors against the state and national interests. The imperial government cannot have confidence in the German organs of the Social Democracy. It is therefore necessary to prevent the appearance of M. Jaures in Berlin at the proposed meeting, and I thereafter consider it advisable that the public appearance of M. Jaures in Berlin shall not take place."

The invitation to M. Jaures came from the Socialist executive committee ruling the party, and was designed to advance the Socialist opposition to the government's Moroccan policy, and to demonstrate the similarity of views on foreign questions of Socialists of all countries. The subject chosen was the task of the Social Democracy in the preservation of the world's peace and the solidarity of the international proletariat.

Allusions had been made in the Reichstag by Chancellor von Buelow to the contrast between the German Socialists and the German Social Democracy, and the disadvantage of Herr Babel, and an account had been circulated in the newspapers and not denied, that the emperor made a similar allusion in a statement on the margin of a newspaper clipping concerning M. Jaures in his course in cooperation with the non-Socialist parties on some public questions.

Therefore, when some of the Conservative papers intimated that M. Jaures would not be allowed to speak the idea was not accepted generally.

Whether Herr Babel will speak in Paris, as is also announced, is not certain. Herr Babel himself is out of town. The French government forbade Babel to speak in Paris six years ago, and the German government prohibited Herr Babel, a member of the Reichstag, from speaking on the French side of the frontier near Mulhausen ten years ago.

Precedents are numerous in most of the continental states. Nevertheless the exclusion of M. Jaures is certain to cause much discussion. The government's action is widely discussed in the public yet. The semi-official North German Gazette will contain the news tonight.

Herr Singer, who, next to Herr Babel, is the leading Socialist in Germany, says the action of the government is ridiculous and is a confession of weakness.

Chancellor von Buelow's telegram to Prince Van Radolin, the German ambassador at Paris, announcing that M. Jaures, the Socialist leader, would not be permitted to speak in Berlin next Sunday, is widely discussed in the press. The Liberal organs condemn the interdiction with varying degrees of sharpness, a number of them asserting that it shows weakness and pettiness on the part of the chancellor.

The Cologne Gazette regards it as a mistaken step.

The Conservative organs for the most

part approve the chancellor's action, but also make some reservations. Some of the newspapers surmise it was dictated by consideration for Russia.

AS VIEWED IN PARIS.

Paris, July 6.—Something of a sensation has been created here by the announcement that Deputy Jaures, leader of the French Socialists, had been prohibited by the German government from speaking at Berlin next Sunday.

The proposed address attracted much discussion, owing to its significance as foreshadowing the common program to be adopted by the Social Democracy of the two countries.

M. Jaures' secretary was seen tonight and said that the deputy was preparing to leave for Berlin. He said that M. Jaures knew nothing of the interdiction, but if the report proved true he would go all the same and find a way of delivering a speech.

TEXAS TORNADO VICTIMS.

Twenty-six Persons Killed and Fifty Injured.

Port Worth, Tex., July 6.—Twenty-six persons are known to have been killed and 50 injured by the tornado which swept over a portion of Montague county, in the northern part of this state, yesterday afternoon. The property loss will probably total \$200,000.

Tornado in Indian Territory.

Denton, Tex., July 6.—The tornado yesterday afternoon swept across Red river and entered Indian Territory near Colbert, tearing down all telegraph wires. Rumors are current of extensive loss of life north of Colbert. The latest reports from Texas are that 23 persons were killed at that place and vicinity. News from Montague, Tex., indicate that 12 dead have been found there and in the vicinity. Two persons were killed at Denton from Dallas states that altogether 63 persons have been reported injured in the tornado, several of whom will die.

It is estimated that property damage to towns, farms and railroads will probably total up \$500,000.
