## CEDAR CITY.

Iron Co., Dec. 25, 1856.

To BISHOP EDWARD HUNTER, PRESIDENT:—Dear Sir:—Bishop P. K. Smith convened the citizens of this city on Friday last, for the purpose of establishing a branch of the Deseret Agricultural and Manufacturing Society. Bishop Smith moved that R. V. Morris be Secretary for the society; seconded by Prest. J. M. Higbee; carried unanimously.

Bishop Smith remarked: I will now proceed to organize the society in this place according to the instructions given me by Prest. E. Hunter. The Lord has seen fit to call this people to reform, and we have to do it in this matter. We have a very large field enclosed here and we want to appoint men to farm; mechanics to attend to their own branch of business and others to attend to our Iron Works, and when the harvest comes we all can assist each other and eat together as our Prophet remarked when he first organized the Deseret Iron Company in the Old Fort.

Prest. Elias Morris remarked: Home manufacture is an interesting subject to me. I do not see how this people can become independent unless we carry into operation the principles of reformation. We want to make our own oils, nails, paint, clothes, &c., &c; and it is of no use for any one to join this society unless he means to stay here and have interest in its progress. I see through the Deseret News that the Bishops have been appointed agents for this society in their respective wards.

Prest. J. M. Higbee said: If we are united in this, we will surely accomplish something. If we want to become an independent people we have to put a check to States transportation which will suck our blood as long as it can and afterwards use us up if possible. We have our Iron Works to carry on. Can we carry them on as we now are trying? No, we cannot. Mechanics work some at their own trade and raise their own grain, and when the farmer wants any small job done he cannot have it done for grain, but they want cash, pork, butter, &c. We want to turn out stock and get us some sheep that we may make our own clothes.

Moved and seconded that Joshua T. Willis be Treasurer for this society. Carried.

Bishop Smith remarked that we have only just made a start of this society and all who wish to become members can hand in their names. Eighty names were received.

Call for stock to take up north and exchange for sheep was next introduced, and about \$800 in stock was received from different individuals for that purpose.

We wish you, Mr. President, to let us know what chance there is there to exchange stock for sheep.

Our Woollen factory (built by Messrs. Haight & Simpkins) is now ready for carding operations and we want more sheep down here so as to keep it going, also to clothe ourselves with cloth of our own make, according to the commandment of God.
