## LOCAL BRIEFS.

Leave for Albuquerque.—The members of the Utah state board of horticulture have left for Albuquerque to arrange for the Utah exhibits at the irrigation convention.

To Attend Bankers' Convention.—A. C. Sullivan, assistant cashier of the Salt Lake Security & Trust company, left Saturday for Denver to attend the bankers' convention.

Back from Europe.—Walter Lund, son of President W. H. Lund, returned Saturday from a pleasant trip to Copenhagen, where he visited with relatives and friends. Mr. Lund left Utah Aug. 6 last for Europe.

Arrival of First Son.—Mr. and Mrs. Charles W. Hohl of 48 Union street, are rejoicing over the arrival at their home of a baby boy, who made his appearance at 8:30 last night. The baby, the first boy of the family, three girls having previously blessed the household.

Will Attend Father's Funeral.—Master John Cluss Pawlos left Saturday night in company with his father, W. W. Cluss, for Billings, Mont., where he will attend the funeral of his father, John Pawlos, who was killed in the railroad wreck near that city recently.

Home for Eureka Elks.—The Eureka Elks are about to erect a three-story brick and stone building, 60x100 feet, to cost \$25,000. The first floor will be used for business purposes, the second for a hotel, and the third for Elks lodge purposes. Watkins & Birch of this city are the architects.

Stocking State Streams.—State Fish and Game Commissioner H. B. Cronan has shipped 15,000 trout fry to Ogden to be placed in the Ogden river, 10,000 to Toledo and 10,000 to Davis county to stock local streams. The fry were all native trout, which are now large enough to send out from the Murray hatchery.

Two More Delegates Named.—Gov. Cutler has announced the appointment of James H. Moyle and J. J. Devereaux of Salt Lake as delegates to the National Irrigation Congress at Albuquerque, N. M. These gentlemen are named in place of two already appointed who have found it impossible to attend the sessions of the congress.

New Fire Horses.—Elephant at headquarters at station No. 4 will be kept busy for a couple of weeks training the four new horses recently purchased for the department by Chief Glor and Capt. Ayland. The animals are fine ones and will be valuable for the fire fighting service. One team will be at No. 4 and the other at headquarters. Chief Glor is now looking for another.

Big Realty Deal.—A deal was closed Saturday evening, by which the Sears Investment company of this city became possessed of 40 acres of land at Fifteenth South and 30th East streets, for \$30,000. It is the intention of the company to invest \$75,000 there in the establishment of a summer resort, to which point the Ogden river will be extended one and a half miles south of Wandamere. There are five lakes on the property, and the location generally is attractive.

Eleven Companies March Away.—Eleven companies of the Fifteenth Infantry, with 14 wagons from the quartermaster's department carrying camp equipment, marched from Fort Douglas at 10 p. m. yesterday on a three day trip northward, leaving G company behind, with Capt. Savage in command of the post. Col. Walter Scott was in command of the detachment. Mulligan was encamped for the night, north of Warm Springs, and left this morning for a point five miles south of Ogden. Field maneuvers will be indulged in.

Mulligan Choked His Wife.—Word has been received from Los Angeles to the effect that T. F. Mulligan, a former resident of Salt Lake and a Pullman conductor, died at 3 p. m. Saturday at about his 10-year-old boy. Before he could make away with the lad, however, he was captured by two men and roughly treated. Mulligan made all possible overtures to his son who, however, declared that he wished to remain with his mother. Mulligan was unable to furnish bail.

Returns from Idaho Town.—Mrs. E. E. Shepard, president of the Utah W. C. T. U., returned last evening from an Idaho lecture tour in the interest of temperance. During the month of her absence, she spoke daily, sometimes in tents, where there was no hall available. Mrs. Shepard met with marked success at Gooding, Idaho, where she assured her that no saloon would ever be permitted to open up in the town. At Boise, Mrs. Shepard addressed the county institute of school teachers, and before returning to Salt Lake, spoke in Ogden on "The Saloon's Debt to Ruined Homes."

## KILLED IN STREET CAR ACCIDENT

John Potter Meets Almost Instant Death on Murray Line Saturday Night.

HE WAS ON HIS ROAD HOME

Rear Trucks Fall to Ride Switch and Launch Throwing Victim in Front of Wheels.

John Potter, who resided with his wife and two children at 215 west Twelfth South street, was almost instantly killed Saturday evening by being run over by a car on the Murray line. The accident happened at Eleventh South, and was caused by the fact that the rear trucks of the car failed to follow the front wheels when a switch was reached.

Mr. Potter was returning home from a shopping tour up town and was standing on the front platform, with several bundles in his arms. The sudden and peculiar lurch of the car threw him from his place and he fell squarely across the track and directly in front of the recalcitrant wheels. Some of the passengers say the unfortunate man was hoisted to the ceiling, while others say that he must have died instantly. It required a wrecking crew to lift the great load resting upon the body. The man's remains were taken to Evans' undertaking establishment.

The car was in charge of Conductor W. H. Summerhayes and Motorman W. L. Brown. Neither appeared to be in the least responsible for the accident. Potter was a laboring man, and his youngest child is but a week old.
