FIVE YEARS FOR FORGERY.

San Francisco Refugee Pleads Guilty Before Judge Armstrong.

F. H. Hamilton, a lawyer formerly of San Francisco, who came here as a refugee after the earthquake in that city, yesterday afternoon appeared before

yesterday afternoon appeared before Jugge Armstrong in the criminal divi-sion of the district court, and pleaded guilty to forgery and uttering a forged instrument and was sentenced to five years in the state prison. When Hamilton first came here he was given a desk in the office of the late Senator Arthur Brown, and the lat-ter became his benefactor. As a token of his appreciation of what Senator Brown did for him he forged the latter's name to several checks. Hamilton started on a criminal career soon after arriving in the city and his speciality was forgery and issuing fictitious checks. There were no less than 35 cases against him, including forgery, uttering forged instruments, issuing fictitious checks and obtaining money by false pretenses. These tanks were built in 1890 and were only intended for temporary use, pending the construction of a reservoir, which was begun but never completed, These tanks, which are wooden, have served their purpose and are unsafe and in a delapitated condition, necessitating an expenditure of more than \$500 yearly. yearly.

TO ENLARGE PIPES.

I would recommend that all pipe be-low the size of six-inch be taken up and replaced by pipe of not less than six-inch size. This small pipe could be used in courts and alleys. I would also recommend that all "dead ends" throughout the system be closed as rapidly as possible by con-

ised in courts and alleys.
I would also recommend that all "dead ends" throughout the system be closed as rapidly as possible, by connecting them, which will permit of better circulation of water and do away with the large expense of flushing which is now necessary in order to remove the accumulation of sand and other matter in the mains at the points near the "dead ends."
I would further recommend that on all extensions made in the future a hydrant or valve be placed at the end so that the main can be flushed. As it is now, many of the extensions have no hydrant or valve within 300 feet of the end, thus preventing a proper flushing. Under the present arrangement, the water used for street sprinkling is drawn from the mains by use of the fire hydrants. This plan is most detrimental to the system, as the hydrants are constantly used during the summer months, and, owing to the inexperience of the men driving the sprinkling wagons the dydrants are broken or damaged frequently: aside from this evil, the large quantities of water taken from the system at the season when the water is needed the most, warks great invisite upon the consumers of water, who pay for water that we are unable to furnish them. This condition could be overcome largely by utilizing the water from the elity canal for street sprinkling by means of constructing a system connected with the canal on these streets where it is practicable.
The nearly every city in the United States a charge for water fis made for churches and for building purposes, and as a very large amount of water is used by these, I would recommend that a charge be made in this city.
Aside from the condition stated, I wish to report that the system is in pood condition.
