PAYING U. S. OFFICERS.

PRESIDENT GRANT said nothing about Utah in his message because according to one of his organs, there was no present necessity to do so. Attorney-General Williams, however, must have considered there was a necessity, for in his report he further legislation by Congress to enforce that part of the Poland Bill which provides that the service and execution of judicial process by the United States Marshal, in Territorial cases (criminal), shall be paid for out of the Territorial Treasury, also the obtaining of funds to keep Territorial prisoners.
