### LOCAL BRIEFS.

City Supt. of Schools Christensen was confined to his home yesterday with an attack of tonsillitis.

The reclamation service is on the increase, the latest arrival being a 10-month boy at the home of J. L. Theard, assistant engineer.

Local jobbers in notions report the holiday trade as lively as ever, with a big demand for illuminated postal cards illustrating noted scenes in Utah and Idaho.

Capt. William T. Walker of the Y. M. C. A. was recently presented by his friends with a gold watch chain, on the occasion of his birthday, as a token of their regard.

Prof. F. A. Metcalf gave a Shakespearean recital last evening, in the Unitarian church, before a small but select audience, which gave the eloquent a pleasant reception.

The St. Paul's parish people have subscribed already over \$1,000 towards the building of a new rectory and parish house on the site of the present building at the rear of the church.

Miss Linda B. Jessup, chairman of the current topics section of the Ladies' Literary club, has an article in the Hot Pops up Provo canyon.

Simon Bamberger, Abel John Evans, W. C. Spence, J. R. Clark, F. J. Paek, Will Ward and John Sagers have been appointed by Gov. Cutler to represent Utah at the immigration conference to be held in New York on Dec. 6 and 7.

The new public library continues to be patronized in its new location, and the number of patrons who appeared on Saturday, was unusually large. The new bronze standards for electric lamps outside the main entrances have arrived, and are being placed into position.

President Thomas Judd of the state board of horticulture is at the Cullen from St. George. He says the heavy rains of the last few months have done the southern part of the state much good. Crops are up to the average, but the grain has been damaged some by chinch bugs.

The stockholders of the Kraft-Nickman Combination Telephone company met yesterday afternoon, and decided to merge into the International Combination Telephone company of Los Angeles and the transfer will take the interests hitherto located in this city to Los Angeles.

Manager James McCalve of the Western Ore. Repairing company, has returned from an extended trip through the northwest, and states that the scheme of the Salt Lake Commercial club to turn European travel west is being talked over everywhere he went, and the newspapers especially are enthusiastic.

The warrants for the monthly salaries of the city officials, councilmen and members of the police and fire departments for October were issued yesterday by City Auditor Felt. Paying are the amounts of the payrolls: Officials, \$1,559.97; councilmen, \$325; police department, \$4,569.50; fire department, \$3,961.85.

Nelson T. Kell, who for the last two years has been an active and valuable salesman with the Clayton Music company, has resigned, to become head-salesman in Chicago for the Story & Clark Organ & Piano company. Mr. Kell leaves Salt Lake with the best wishes of the local trade and many other friends.

Civil service examinations will be held in this city, Nov. 13, for the position of saddler in the quartermaster's department at large, at Jeffersonville, Ind., with salary at \$540; also, for the position of physician (man) in the Indian service, at \$1,000, San Juan agency, N. M., and at \$600 per annum at Fort Bidwell, Cal. Age limit, 25 to 55.

Arthur Macfarlane, yard manager for the Burton Coal company, met with a rather peculiar accident Monday afternoon. The gentleman was watering a horse when another on the opposite side of the fence, reared over and hit him on the back of the neck, inflicting an ugly wound, in which the imprints of its teeth were plainly visible. While the wound is painful, no serious consequences are anticipated.

R. G. Brooks of Scranton, Pa., a coal operator and banker, is in this city for a short time on mining business. He expresses himself as much pleased with the efforts made to secure a water supply for Salt Lake. Mr. Brooks thinks the town should not stop short of 50,000,000 gallons a day supply, and in remarking about water, said that eastern people are beginning to realize what irrigation means to a country.

State Organizer C. T. Turner of the Woodmen of the World has returned from Denver where he has been a lively experience. He says the trouble arose from the delay in printing his vouchers so that he could not turn in properly his expense accounts. But the matter has been satisfactorily settled, he says, and he further states that he was not arrested, as the dispatches alleged. Mr. Turner has been reinstated as Utah state organizer.

E. W. Tutlock has filed application with the state engineer for 350 sec. ft. of water from Farmington Creek, Garfield county, with which to operate power for electricity and other purposes in Farmington and elsewhere. The diverting canal will be 10,000 feet long. E. T. Tutlock of this city, filed application for 1,175 sec. ft. of water from the Green river in Wasatch county, with which to irrigate 78,500 acres in four townships, the diverting canal being 116,160 feet.
