### Important Irrigation Suit Involving Use of Weber River Waters-Fires man Lee Sued for Divorce.

A special meeting of the city council was held last evening for the purpose of considering the paving of Washington avenue.

The city attorney and Recorder Critchlow, the committee to whom was referred the matter of preparing a notice of intention to create paving district No. 1, and to paye said district. reported a notice to pave Washington avenue between Twenty-third and Twenty-fifth streets, to curb with randstone curbing 5 inches thick and 24 inches deep, to build a sandstone block not less than 6 feet wide; ave the street intersections with sandstone blocks; to build waterways at id intersections of concrete, with cas covers; to build cross walks standstone flags 18 inches wide and inches thick; to require the Ogder hapid Transit company to pave a strip in the center of Washington avenue, h said district, 10 feet 6 inches wide of ther side of said center line of Washngton avenue, except at the intersec tions of cross streets, which part of raid pavement shall be paved by Ogden City, and to pave all the remaining rtions of said street, as above desig nated, with asphaltum on a base Portland cement concrete 6 inches

The estimated cost of such improvements is \$52,000. For the payment of the costs and expenses thereof, the city council, intends to levy local taxes upon the real estate lying and being with a said paying district to the extent of tue benefits to such property by reaon of such improvements.
